

POPE'S ILLNESS.

Aged Pontiff Underwent an Operation.

HIS GENERAL CONDITION IS SOME BETTER.

Latest Bulletins From the Beside of His Holiness.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Rome, July 7.—Following is the text of the bulletin regarding the condition of the Pope issued at 9.20 o'clock this morning.

"The Pope passed a restless night without sleep. Nourishment, however, had been more freely taken and the general condition of patient is a little more reassuring. An objective examination shows a change in the right thorax and middle lobe of lung which, up to yesterday did not permit passage of air, now allows the air to penetrate. On the other hand the interior scene has become more obtuse and transmission of vocal and tactile vibration is wanting. This leads to the belief that there is liquid in the pleura. An experimental incision will be made. The action of the heart is depressed so much as to render the renal function insufficient and to cause cyanosis of the hands. (Sgd.)

There is no denying that the life of the Pontiff is slowly wasting away. There are moments when he seems better and others in which he is worse. But no one doubts that hour by hour, moment by moment he is leaving the world.

By the Pope's express desire all his relations have been to see the Pontiff today. The scene was most touching. His nephews, to whom he had been a real father, entered the room sobbing. His Holiness soothed them saying: "I feel the moment approaching when I must leave you. Say our last good-bye, I am about to enter Eternal life, but do not grieve for me, I am about to enter my real happiness." Before leaving the room they all kissed the hand of the Pontiff reverently, fearing it was for the last time.

Rome 7.—Dr. Mazzoni, in an interview this afternoon admitted that they have given up all hopes of saving the Pope's life. The puncturing of the pleura has been postponed until two o'clock this afternoon.

Rome, July 7, 2.30 p.m.—The Pope has been operated upon and his general condition is now better.

Rome, July 7, 3 p.m.—The following bulletin has been issued: "The test puncture of the pleura has been made and eight hundred grams of liquid have been taken off. A rapid examination showed that some mucus was rattling in the lung which was originally affected. The Pope underwent the operation with courage. His general condition is some better and he is resting."

Rome, July 7, 4 p.m.—After the operation Dr. Mazzoni said danger remained imminent, but the illness from which the Pope was suffering was full of surprises. His Holiness might even live three days longer.

DISTRESSING ACCIDENT.

Mrs. Abraham Anderson Accidentally Shot Near Her Home—Wound Not Serious.

An accident, resulting from the careless discharge of firearms, occurred on Victoria Lane extension near the entrance to the trotting park, shortly after nine o'clock last evening. It appears that Robert McNutt, who lives on O'dell Avenue, has been bothered considerably of late by skunks in the neighborhood of his house, and has been waging war on them with a shot gun. Shortly after dusk last evening he loaded the gun, went out doors, and observing what he thought to be one of the odoriferous pests ambling along near the fence, he levelled the gun at it and fired. So far as the supposed skunk was concerned his aim seems to have been bad, for no trace of the animal alive or dead could afterwards be found. A chance shot however, will often do mischief and that proved to be the case in this instance for Mrs. Anderson who was walking along the street near the park, was struck in the face by one of the leaden pellets. She was immediately assisted to her home on Smythe street, and Drs. Bridges and Vanwart were summoned to the scene. They found on examination that a single shot had entered just above the woman's right eye, which it missed by a scant margin, and inflicted a painful flesh wound. They were not long in locating and extracting the bullet, and no serious results are anticipated.

The accident caused great excitement in the neighbourhood for a time, as it was thought that Mrs. Anderson had been dangerously wounded. Mr. McNutt who fired the shot, naturally feels very badly over the affair, and will probably be more careful next time he puts a gun to his shoulder.

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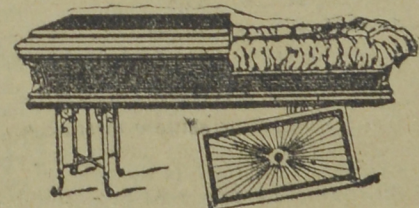
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
