AMONG THE CURLERS.

Winners in the First Round of Games for Neill Medal.

If the rink had been twice its present size all its space would not have been more than sufficient to accommodate the curlers who put in an appearance last night. More than fifty members were present to participate in the opening games of the local rinks' competition for the Neill medal, or to watch the play of the men scheduled for the occasion. Half a hundred curlers, eager, enthusi-

astic, and that number only a little more than half the present membership of the Fredericton club.

At no time in its half century history has the club been in such a flourishing condition, and its record in games with foreign clubs this season is expected to be most creditable. Hitherto not more than four rinks, sixteen men, have gone abroad to uphold the honor of the club, but this year there is strong talk of sending six rinks, twenty-four men, and the material is at hand for the selection of that number of keen players. All arrangements for games with outside clubs at home and abroad will be made at the regular monthly meeting of the club next Tuesday evening. The foreign tour will include games with St. Stephen and the Thistles and St. Andrews clubs of St. John, and will probably take place during the week commencing January 12. The Moncton club is expected here early in January, and the St. John and St. Stephen clubs will arrive for return matches later.

President Hawthorn is naturally very proud of the thriving condition of the club under his leadership, and well he may be.

Ottawa, Dec. 29.—Sir Richard Cartwright has intimated to the Liberals of South Oxford, that he will not seek re-election in that district. It is too far from Ottawa for him to devote the attention he would like to its local interests.

The Minister of Trade and Commerce, however, has not the remotest idea of dropping out of politics, but in the next parliament will probably be found sitting for an eastern constituency. His home is in Kingston.
