

NEW BRUNSWICK LEGISLATURE.

Mr. Whitehead Introduced the Fredericton Bills.

MR. OSMAN WITHDREW HIS OBJECTIONABLE RESOLUTION.

Premier Paid Tribute to Late Sir Oliver Mowatt.

In the legislature Monday afternoon Mr. Whitehead introduced bills to regulate civic elections in Fredericton; to authorize the construction of permanent sewers in Fredericton; to amend the administration of justice in York; to enable Fredericton to assess for agricultural purposes, and to authorize Fredericton to provide a modern system of lighting.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Tweedie the time for introducing private bills was extended for five days.

Mr. Whitehead presented the petition of John F. Stairs and others, in favor of the bill to incorporate the Alexander Gibson Company.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie, in reply to Mr. Hazen as to what action had been taken by the government to obtain from the Dominion government payment of the sum of \$8,000 refund on fishery leases, said that he had had several interviews with the late Minister of Marine, Mr. Sutherland, and he had promised to have the matter referred to the Council and disposed of. In the absence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier nothing could be done. Since Mr. Prefontaine had become Minister of Marine he had also had interviews with him, and he had promised to give the matter his attention. He had also interviewed the Minister of Justice on the subject. The claim had now become \$11,000 by the addition of interest. The government had pressed it in every possible way and he had no doubt that if Mr. Sutherland had remained Minister of Marine it would have been settled before now. He hoped to have it disposed of at an early day.

Mr. Osman moved a resolution relating to City of Fredericton. He said the newspapers of this city had reflected on him for bringing up this matter but it was one which he thought was of public interest, affecting as it did not only Fredericton but the whole province. It was certainly to be regretted that there was any reason for reflecting on Fredericton with regard to its sewerage for it was a very beautiful city which he had always admired. But if children and young persons from other parts of the province came here and were stricken with typhoid fever, as was the case with a beautiful girl from Albert, and the cause was said to be imperfect sewerage, then the sewerage of Fredericton became a provincial concern. He referred to the terrible scourge which had recently swept over the city of Ithaca, by which hundreds were stricken down. That his motion was justified was shown by the fact that a bill for the improvement of the sewerage of Fredericton had recently been introduced, and this having been done with the permission of his seconder, he would withdraw his resolution.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said that by the death of the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, Canada had lost a public man who was one of the fathers of confederation, and he thought that the House should place on record its appreciation of his character and services. On his motion a committee, consisting of himself, Mr. Hazen and the Hon. Mr. Hill, was appointed to draft a suitable resolution.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie laid on the table a communications which had been received by the lieutenant governor from the clerk of the privy council of Canada, in regard to

the readjustment of representation. It contained the opinion of the minister of justice adverse to the view of the government of New Brunswick, and the approval of the privy council of Canada of the minister of justice's opinion.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said that he had received a telegram from the attorney general, stating that the special case on the question of redistribution would be argued before the Supreme Court tomorrow, that the province of Ontario was represented by a very able lawyer and that he entirely concurred in the New Brunswick view of the case.

The bill to authorize the Surveyor-General to purchase land from the New Brunswick Railway Company and to dispose of the same to bona fide settlers which had been previously passed in committee was agreed to and reported.

The following bills were also agreed to as amended by the committees.

To change the time of holding the annual congregational meeting of St. James Church, Newcastle.

To incorporate the trustees of the Main Street Baptist church at Sackville.

An act relating to the Tobique Salmon Club. The object of this bill is to enable the club to hold its meetings in New York City.

To confirm the issuing of bonds and stock by the New Brunswick Southern Railway Co., and also to confirm the transfer of the Shore Line railway to said company.

Northwest Legislature.

Winnipeg, April 16.—The Northwest Legislative Assembly opened at Regina today, being the first meeting since the general elections. Mr. A. B. Gillis, member for Whitewood, was elected Speaker. Lieut.-Gov. Forget in his speech from the throne, referred to the prosperity of the country having immeasurably increased the duties and responsibilities of the Northwest Government and legislature. The speech urged, as in past years, the claims of the Territories to the Provincial status, which was now all the more necessary in consequence of the conditions that prevailed. The most important announcement in the speech was that the Federal government had acceded to the request of the Territorial government to extend the jurisdiction of the legislature to the important subject of land titles. The House adjourned until Monday.

MANUAL TRAINING SCHOOL.

Macdonald Grant for Fredericton Institution Will Soon Expire.

In his report to the Chief Superintendent of Education on the manual training school in Fredericton, Mr. E. E. MacCready says:

On April 10, 1903, will expire the three years for which Sir Wm. Macdonald arranged to carry on the manual training work at Fredericton. During this time there have been 1,315 persons taking courses in manual training at Fredericton (and at summer school held in St. John).

Boys of Fredericton (some of whom have attended during the entire three years)..... 298
Boys from Deaf and Dumb school..... 15
Boys at summer school, (St. John)..... 16
Teachers at summer courses..... 88
Teachers class, Fredericton and vicinity..... 34
Student teachers at Normal School, woodwork..... 661
Student teachers at Normal school, Cardboard..... 203
Total..... 1315

Because of the educational and practical value of manual training it is important that it be continued in connection with the Provincial Normal School; further, that special three months' courses be arranged for rural school teachers to prepare them to teach this subject in their schools.

To this report Dr. Inch adds: As stated in the above report, the three years during which Sir Wm. Macdonald has made provision for carrying on the Manual Training work at Fredericton will end in April. I am informed that the work will be continued at his expense until the close of the school year on June 30th. The experiment has been an unqualified success. The possibility of adding this work to the public school course without detriment to the studies which must always be regarded as the basis of a sound education has been demonstrated. The duty of continuing and developing the work now devolves upon School Boards and the Provincial authorities.

Battle of Waterloo.

The London Daily Graphic of April 6 says:—In presiding at the annual dinner of the Newspaper Press Fund on Saturday, Mr. Leopold de Rothschild told the true version of the famous story of the way in which the first news of the battle of Waterloo reached London. He said the tradition with regard to the news of the battle of Waterloo coming to his grandfather had been circulated in various forms. The fact was that the news came through the medium of a small Dutch newspaper. The news was published in a single line—"Great victory of the English at Amsterdam." His grandfather, who was the owner of some ships, told his captains that whenever they went anywhere they were always to bring him the latest newspapers. One of these trusted captains arrived with a paper announcing the great victory. His grandfather, who believed as they all did now in the accuracy of all newspapers—(Laughter)—immediately took the news to the Treasury, and gave the information to Lord Liverpool. He did not tell him how he knew it, and his news was scouted because the intelligence had arrived of the defeat of the English troops on the previous day. Mr. de Rothschild also stated that during the siege of Paris the famous house in New Court used to receive news by pigeon-post, and they knew a fortnight beforehand when Paris was about to capitulate and were able to send the first provisions into the town.
