

IRISH SECRET'RY

Denies that he is to
Succeed Lord Minto

AS GOVERNOR GENERAL
OF CANADA,

Although he Very Highly
Appreciates the
Position.

London, Aug. 29.—Hon. Chas. Wyndham denies the report that he is about to resign the Irish secretaryship with the idea that he would be appointed to succeed Lord Minto as Governor General of Canada.

Before he was appointed to the cabinet Mr. Wyndham expressed envy of the position of Governor General of such a country as Canada.

The great personal charm and attainments of both himself and his wife, Countess Grosvenor, seem to mark them out as an ideal vice regal pair.

Wyndham's denial, however, puts the appointment out of the question for the moment, but in the event of a ministerial crisis more may possibly be heard of in the matter.

NO RACE TODAY.

Too Much Wind for the Reliance and Shamrock—Next Fry Monday.

New York, Aug. 29.—The regatta committee of the New York Yacht Club, has decided that today's race between Reliance and Shamrock III, shall be postponed, owing to the high wind and heavy sea outside Sandy Hook.

The decision was reached at a meeting held in the Yacht Club at 7 o'clock this morning, at which a despatch was read from C. O. Ivelin, saying that at a meeting held on board the Teader Sunbeam at Sandy Hook this morning, it had been decided, in consequence of the prevailing gale, that no attempt should be made to race the yachts today.

Whether or not a race will be sailed on Monday, is not yet known, but the probabilities are that there will be one.

PROBABLE MURDER.

TROUBLESOME HARVESTERS.

Men from Nova Scotia Made Hot Times in the West.

White River, Ont., Aug. 28.—There was great excitement in this settlement yesterday. For the past week there have been half a dozen specials taking harvesters from eastern Canada to Manitoba and west passing through White River every day. Yesterday a Nova Scotia contingent came

on the scene. They have run things pretty much as they liked since leaving North Bay. There they smashed everything they could lay hands on around the depot, and as a result eight men were locked up. They held high jinks at Cartier and some other smaller towns along the line. At Chapleau they demanded that the railway restaurant be opened up and they ate everything eatable in sight without paying for it. They then broke all the dishes, lamps, mirrors and windows, and even pulled up part of the station platform. Every male citizen in the place was sworn in as a special constable, but with such a crowd they could do nothing.

The railway authorities gave instruction to their employees on the road to prepare themselves for the coming of the gang, and later sent messages to close all restaurants and station buildings as far as Port Arthur. Although the train bringing the gang left North Bay on Wednesday afternoon it was late yesterday before it reached White River. Instead of coming into the railway yard the engine's crew met the harvesters outside of the settlement, intending to change engines and pass through without stopping at the platform. The plan proved successful, though some of the crowd got off and entered houses and gardens in the vicinity, stripped clothes lines, pulled up potatoes, plants and amused themselves shooting chickens with revolvers. There is a Swedish family named Cremene living here. Mr. Cremene was locked into one of the rooms and about fifty men ransacked the house, breaking dishes and furniture and carrying off all the eatables in the house. The garden surrounding the house, which is noted for miles east and west for its many beautiful flowers, was totally destroyed.

A few of the crowd attempted to carry off some of the belongings of the men engaged in building cottages for employees of the railway, but the workmen attacked them with their tools, the teamster striking one of the crowd with a shovel, rendering him insensible.

A Dominion immigrant officer came from the west to take the party in charge, but his principal duty will be to mark out the ringleaders and have them arrested when the train reaches Winnipeg. He advised the White River people to defend themselves with firearms. Special police are awaiting the train at Port Arthur and Fort William.

Sergeant's Annual Outing.

The staff sergeants and sergeants of the R. C. R. and a few friends had their annual outing on the Oromocto river this week. The trip was made in the trim little steam yacht belonging to the corps and was very much enjoyed. The start for home was made after the shades of night had fallen, and no doubt a very quick run would have been made but for an unfortunate mishap which occurred near the Mitchell boom. The steering gear and propeller of the craft got out of kilter, which necessitated the passengers disembarking and continuing the journey home on foot. They had to do some leg running to reach the shore, and one of the party, who enjoys quite a reputation as a vocalist, came in for a rather severe ducking as the result of an unsuccessful effort to touch bottom.

Track Sensations.

Bangor, Aug. 28.—Noah R., who won a race yesterday in the 2.21 class, was identified today as Fred Wilton with a record of 2.09 1/4. The horse, his owner, Henry P. Tarbox of Lewiston, and Driver Chas. Harrison of Chicago were expelled from the tracks of the National Trotting Association. Winnie G. dropped dead at the end of the first heat of the 2.25 class today.

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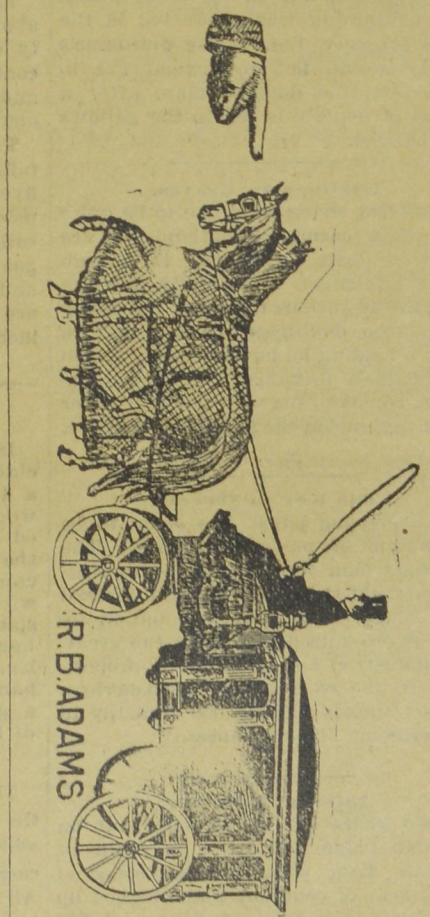
