Labor Day Excursion.

The prospects point to the Black Knights taking a good number on the excursion to St. John on Labor Day. The Victoria leaves here at 7.30 a. m., and leaves St. John at 7 o'clock p. m., thus giving the visitors a full half day in St. John, and an enjoyable sail on the river.

Death at Marysville.

The death occurred at Marysville last evening after a short illness of cholera infantum of Mabel A., the eighteen months old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Lee Meehan. Booming the Exhibition.

Sussex Record: W. S. Hooper, manager of the Fredericton exhibition, was in Sussex on Thursday of this week looking up exhibits. He already has the promise of some live stock exhibits from this section, and expects more. Stockmen from all over the province are going to Fredericton, and several entries in these classes have been sent in from Nova Scotia. Mr. Hooper informs the Record that every available foot of space in the

industrial building was taken up some weeks ago. Everything points to Fredericton exhibition being a great success.

AROUND THE MARKET.

A Brisk Demand for the Products of the Farm.

There was a splendid market this morning, and for several hours, Phoenix Square presented a very animated appearance. Nearly all the space on the four sides of the city hall was filled up with produce laden teams; the walk was thronged with people of both sexes in search of something for their Sunday dinner, and across the way, near the Normal school fence, there was another crowd, listening to Auctioneer Atherton expatiate on the merits of a couple of old wagons, some second hand furniture, and divers articles of household utility, selected at random from his old curiosity shop on York street.

Chickens appeared to be trumps in the market this morning, and a great many were quickly disposed of. The large plump ones, the ages of which seemed to be established beyond a doubt, sold at 50 and 60 cents, while the skinny specimens which had the appearance of having been neglected in their youth, were a trifle slow in getting away at 35 and 40 cents. Other varieties of poultry were rather scarce, there being no geese and turkeys and but few ducks. Lamb was plentiful, as usual, and seemed to be in fair demand at 9 and 10 cents per pound by the quarter. Butter in prints sold for 18 cents, and for a like amount of money a dozen of eggs were thrown in.

All kinds of vegetables and roots were plentiful and brought very good prices. The outlook for an abundant yield of potatoes and turnips this season is very good and the quality is said to be much better than usual. Potatoes seemed to vary somewhat in price this morning, some farmers asking \$1.50 per barrel, for them and others being content to accept \$1.25. Apples are also a fair crop, and the New Brunswickers and Astracans in the market this morning brought from 50 to 75 cents per bushel.

STREET LIGHTING.

Gaslight Company accept City's offer to purchase the plant.

City Clerk Beckwith is in receipt of a letter from F. I. Morrison, Secretary of the Fredericton Gaslight Company, formally accepting on behalf of the Company the City Council's offer for the purchase of the street lighting plant. The suggestion was made in the letter that the city clerk meet with J. H. Barry, K. C. the company's solicitor, and complete arrangements for the transfer of the property. After consulting Chairman Clark of the electric light committee, the city clerk notified the company to have the solicitor draw up a form of contract for submission to the council.

The price to be paid by the city for the plant is in the neighborhood of \$13,800. The present street lighting contract expires in October.

Convicted of Murder.

Yesterday at Bangor, William A. Albert, colored, was convicted of murder in the first degree. He shot and killed Policeman Jordan in that city last March. Albert in his testimony said he was born in Fredericton thirty-one years ago, removed to Woodstock when young and thence to Bangor in 1887. He will be sentenced Monday, probably to life imprisonment. The death penalty is not inflicted in Maine.

Music Hath Charms.

The Fredericton brass band entertained a large crowd of people on Parliament square last evening with one of their popular open air concerts. The night was beautifully fine, and the music was greatly enjoyed.

This morning the band of the Royal Canadian Regiment played a capital program on the officers' square.

The Exhibition Races.

Entries for the big race meeting to be held at the trotting park here during exhibition week, were to have closed today, but the park association have decided to extend the time until Sept. 10th. Already quite a number of entries have been received, several being from Halifax and Amherst horsemen.

Organ Recital.

On Sunday evening at the close of the regular service Mr. Lemont will give a short recital in the Methodist church. Miss Beckwith of Bridgetown, N. S., and Miss Fanny Palmer will assist. Sunday's services will be the last at which Mr. Lemont will officiate before leaving for Boston.

Death at Oromocto.

Mr. Richard Kelley died quite suddenly at his home at Oromocto last evening. Mr. Kelley had been around apparently in good health during the day, but shortly after entering the house complained of feeling unwell, and died in a few minutes. Mr. Kelley was seventy three years of age, and leaves three sons James, Allen and William. Two daughters Mrs. Shaw and Mrs. John Barry reside at Oromocto, and a number of daughters in the States. Mr. Kelley was well and favourably known in Sunbury county, and his death will be heard with regret by a large circle of friends. The funeral will take place Wednesday at Oromocto.

A New Sewer.

Roadmaster McKay has a crew of men at work putting in a new surface sewer on St. John street. A terra cotta pipe will be laid down on the lower side of the street from Charlotte street to the river. It is estimated that the work will cost in the neighborhood of \$1000.

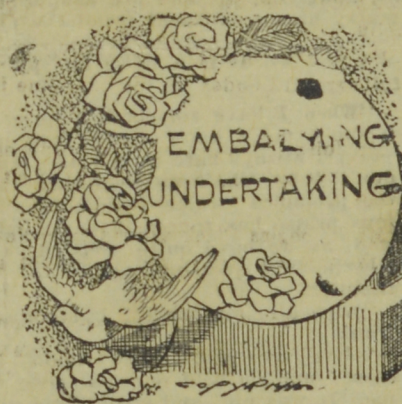
