In the Courts.

The trial of the suit of Hickey vs. Thornton an action of trover, is still going on before Judge Wilson at the county council chamber. L. E. Young of Woodstock is counsel for plaintiff, and A. R. Slipp and R. B. Hanson for defendant.

The Goodspeed Case.

As already announced in the Herald's despatches, the jury in the Goodspeed case was unable to arrive at a verdict. After nearly five hours' deliberation yesterday, late in the afternoon they were discharged. The final ballot was nine for acquittal and three for conviction. The case now stands practically where it

was a week ago, though nothing has been left undone to bring to light all the facts regarding Goodspeed's connection with the tragedy of August last. A new trial is in order, and in the meantime Goodspeed will be arraigned on the burglary charges at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

LAID TO REST.

The Late James A. Garvey Buried With Military Honors.

The funeral of the late James A. Garvey took place from his home on the Hanwell Road at two o'clock this afternoon under the auspices of the 71st regiment, of which he was a member, and was largely attended. The remains were taken to the Cathedral where an impressive service was conducted by Rev. Dean Partridge, and interment was made at Forest Hill cemetery. The firing party, which was commanded by Sergt. Brewer was from the 71st regiment, and the R. C. R. band, playing Webster's funeral march, led the procession from the Cathedral to the cemetery. A number of the officers of the 71st regiment and R. C. R. attended as mourners. Capt. McLeod, to whose company the deceased belonged, was unable to be present on account of an engagement at the circuit court. Undertaker John G. Adams had charge of the arrangements.

The funeral of the late Rev. P. R. Knight took place at Kingsclear yesterday afternoon and was one of the largest seen at that place for some time. A most impressive service was conducted at the Baptist church by Rev. George Howard, who spoke in eulogistic terms of the life, work and character of the deceased. Interment was made in the Baptist cemetery. Robert R. Adams was the officiating undertaker.

The remains of the late Mrs. R. H. Rainsford were laid to rest yesterday afternoon in the old burying ground. The funeral service was conducted at St. Ann's church by Rector Roberts, in the presence of a number of sorrowing friends and relatives. Undertaker John G. Adams had charge of the arrangements.

Ald. Stockford has called a meeting of the fire committee of the city council for Friday evening, to award a contract for supplying hay and oats for the city horses.

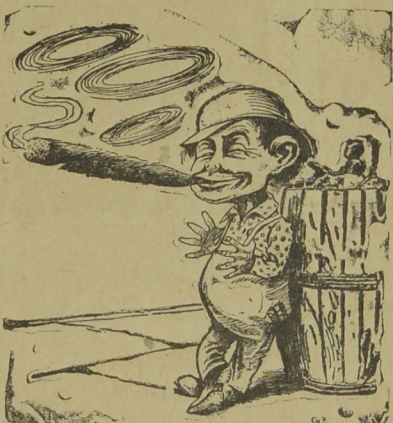
