A TOWN WIPED OUT.

New Orleans, La., Sept. 8.—Advices received here by steamer state the town of San Miguel, Mexico, has been totally wiped out by a hurricane, not a living creature being in sight. The hurricane caused an immense damage along the coast, and many lives are reported lost.

DISASTROUS FIRE.

Pittsburg, Pa.,—Sept. 8.—Fire in the stables of the Alleghany Transfer Company stables here this morning, caused a loss of \$200,000. One hundred horses were either burned to death or so badly injured they will have to be shot. Between forty and sixty waggons and other property was destroyed.

BECOMING SERIOUS.
