THE MANITOBA ELECTIONS.

Some of the returns from the Manitoba general election are incomplete, but they are sufficiently full to show that the Roblin Tory government has been sustained by an overwhelming majority. The Liberals in the new legislature will probably not number over half a dozen.

Mr. Greenway the opposition leader is re-elected, but his following will be so small as to be ineffective. Premier Roblin and probably all of his colleagues have secured re-election.

The result will no doubt be heralded as a great Conservative victory, and will put more spirit into the members of that party in the west.

It was announced some days ago that Hon. Mr. Sifton was making the fight his own, but the Minister of the Interior apparently took no part in the election, remaining at Ottawa throughout the whole campaign to attend to his parliamentary duties. What effect, if any, the result will have on the federal situation in Manitoba is too early to forecast, but it will probably be found that the elections largely turned on local issues, and that the bold and aggressive railway policy of the Roblin ministry had considerable to do with achieving victory for the government.

It is possible that Mr. Blair's resignation and the government's decision to build the Grand Trunk Pacific in the way proposed had some bearing on the elections. The people of Manitoba and the West generally, are strongly in favor of Mr. Blair's plan of a government owned and operated road, and Mr. Greenway's friends may have been somewhat handicapped by recent events at Ottawa.

THE POPE'S SUCCESSOR.

The world, more especially the Roman Catholic world, will await with interest the election of a successor to Pope Leo XIII, who has laid down the burdens of a long and active life, and whose remains will be interred ten days hence with all the magnificent pageantry of his church.

The successor to the deceased prince of the church will be elected by the sacred college, composed of the cardinals, and the conclave is expected to meet August 3rd. The great majority of the cardinals are Italians and the expectation is that one of that nationality will be selected as the next occupant of the Vatican. The only American who will have a voice in the matter is Cardinal Gibbons, who is already in Rome.

The Sun has nominated Senator Ellis for the vacant position in the Cabinet, but although we have had our ear close to the ground, we have not yet heard anybody seconding the nomination. If there is a cabinet position coming to this province, and there will be rebellion in the air if otherwise, the job must be given to that worthy, true and tried Liberal, Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, who, when he voluntarily laid down the premiership of New Brunswick to carry Westmorland made a sacrifice that stamped him as a man deserving the very best consideration of his party. Mr. Emmerson's opportunity has arrived, and his friends rejoice that he is to be recognized.

As soon as Mr. Foster heard of Mr. Blair's resignation he packed his grip at Toronto and promptly embarked for Apohaqui. Possibly the Hon. George is feeling his way back to a nomination in St. John.

The Halifax Chronicle thinks that the Tory organs are greasing Mr. Blair with praise with the expectation or at least the desire of swallowing him later.

An Ontario Tory newspaper, referring to the probability of Hon. Mr. Emmerson entering the cabinet enquires "Who is Emmerson?" He is not known in Ontario? Similar observations were made respecting Mr. Blair, when he entered the cabinet in 1896, but Ontario has since discovered the ex-minister of railways to be one of the ablest men who ever sat in the federal cabinet. As well might we ask in New Brunswick, "Who is Cartwright?" or "Who is Melock?" They are not known in this province except by reputation. They have certainly never, or at least seldom been seen in the maritime provinces.

Hamilton Times, Liberal: Mr. Blair has been regarded as a capable and painstaking Minister and it is certain that he has been a political power in New Brunswick. He brought to the Laurier government a strong following from that province, and his achievement of defeating Hon. George E. Foster, backed by the Canadian Pacific, in St. John in 1900 proved his own strength and influence. There are plenty of men in the party competent to fill the office of Minister of Railways, but we doubt if any of them can do better than Mr. Blair has done, and we regret that anything should have occurred to necessitate his resignation.

The government is said to have had the Grand Trunk Pacific railway scheme under consideration Saturday, but it is announced that the details of the proposition are yet incomplete. The report is current that if the scheme is submitted to Parliament as already outlined, there may be some uncertainty about the government securing its passage through the Senate. Undoubtedly the Conservatives will solidly oppose the scheme, and there is a rumor that a number of Liberal senators may endorse Mr. Blair's view, and decline to aid in the passage of the resolutions through the upper house.

Moncton Transcript: Our esteemed local contemporary doesn't wish the Hon. Mr. Emmerson, M. P., to become a cabinet minister because some Tory sheet says he is not known in Ontario. Possibly so, but he was well enough known in Westmorland county to defeat Mr. H. A. Powell by a decisive majority, and well enough known in New Brunswick to carry the province as premier by the largest majority ever secured in the legislature. If Mr. Emmerson therefore is unknown, it will be easy to get Messrs. Hazen and Powell to introduce him—they have both made his acquaintance.

Halifax Herald, Tory:—Whatever people may think of Mr. Blair's ability as a minister of railways, there can be no doubt of his ability as a letter writer. Those letters of his to Sir Wilfrid Laurier demonstrate two facts very clearly; first, that Mr. Blair has decided opinions, and second, that he knows how to express them in forcible terms.

James Innes, Liberal ex-M. P. for South Wellington, Ontario, and a former well known newspaper editor of Guelph, died suddenly of heart disease at Sydney, N. S., Friday, while on his way to Newfoundland.

C. P. R. COLLISION.

Two Cars Thrown Into River—Loss of Life Feared.

Two cars of freight were thrown into the river. It is feared that several men went down with the cars and are still in the wreck at the bottom of the river, but this is not certain. Several were injured.
