## BRITAIN'S ATTITUDE.

Lord Charles Beresford, who is coming to America, was asked just before he embarked what he thought of the Venezuelan situation. "Thank God," he exclaimed, "that it has come out all right. But it has taught our government a lesson—that they must not try their hand again at such a game without the partnership of the United States. I do not say a word against Germany, but I do think it is England's advantage to come right out, and not only say we support the Monroe doctrine, but, by heavens, we are willing to fight for it."

This should ensure Lord Beresford a hearty reception in the United States. The idea of Englishmen fighting for the Monroe doctrine is a new phase of the situation, but not an unreasonable one. Great Britain is certainly one European power that has no ambition for territorial extension in America, and so is not affected by the Monroe doctrine, but she has important colonies which might be attacked by some other European power, and her duty is therefore clearly as Lord Beresford indicates.

It is pleasant to read that even the leading Boers received Mr. Chamberlain kindly in Pretoria. During the war they blamed the colonial secretary for all their troubles. It was indeed the popular thing to curse Chamberlain, but he was and is really the best friend the Boers have. If they will let him work out the new colonies' destiny as he desires the next generation of Boers will rise up and call his memory blessed.

At last Canada is coming in for the lion's share of the increase of emigration from the British isles. Returns issued by the Imperial government for the past year indicate increased emigration to Canada of 59 per cent. Emigration to the United States increased 20 per cent., and to South Africa, 82 per cent. Emigration to Australia declined 6 per cent.

Local bye-elections in three Ontario constituencies took place today and the Ross government's existence largely hangs on the result. If they carry all three ridings the government is safe, if they lose all the prospect for the opposition coming into power is good.

Mr. Tarte has dug himself out again. He spoke last night to a French-Canadian gathering at Worcester, Mass., and declared himself independent of party ties. He has been Conservative and Liberal and now he is a Mugwump.

The Fredericton curlers at St. John showed the Scotchmen how to play their own particular game. The men from across the water, however, are true sportsmen and know how to take defeat.

Mr. Broderick, the minister of war, has taken a wife, leaving only two bachelors in the British cabinet, Premier Balfour and Mr. Austen Chamberlain, in that respect resembling our local government.

Think of it. A Liberal, mayor of Toronto. The thing has only happened twice in a quarter of a century. Mr. Fleming was the [other Liberal elected some years ago.]

Canada rejoices in the restoration of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's health. He arrived at Ottawa today in excellent condition, ready to resume his public duties.

Rev. David Flemming, a Prominent Presbyterian Clergyman Among His Friends Here.
