GOVERNMENT MEET.

Report on the Deaf and Dumb Enquiry Under Consideration.

A SUBSIDY ASKED TO AID IN EXTENDING STANLEY RAILWAY.

All of the members of the local government were present at a meeting held in executive council chamber last evening. Some routine business was transacted, after which Dr. Moore, president of the York and Carleton Railway was given a hearing. He stated that the company proposed extending their line from Stanley Village to the rich timber lands at the head of the settlement, a distance of about 4½ miles, and asked that the usual subsidy be granted by the government in aid of the work. In support of his application he presented a petition signed by a number of business men of Fredericton and points along the Nashwaak. The government promised to take the matter into consideration.

W. C. H. Grimmer appeared on behalf of the towns of St. Stephen and Milltown and asked that in future the proceeds of Scott Act penalties be paid by the Receiver General to the councils of those towns, on consideration of their undertaking to defray the expenses of enforcing the act. The government promised to take the matter into consideration. It appears that under an act of last session of the Dominion Parliament all monies derived from Scott Act fees are to go to the Receiver General of the province and are to be used in enforcing the act.

The report of Commissioner Barry who conducted the Deaf and Dumb enquiry, is now in the hands of the government, but has not yet been dealt with.

The government held another meeting this morning, all being present except the attorney general, who is engaged in court. Only business of a routine nature was transacted. The Board of Education is in session this afternoon.
