SUNBURY.

The electors of Sunbury who appreciate the advantages of good government, and believe that the county has men within its own borders capable of representing the constituency in the legislature, are called to gather at the Burton court house at 2.30 p. m. Thursday, Feb. 12th, to nominate two friends of the administration to contest the approaching election.

No doubt there will be a ready response to the call, for Sunbury is tired of her present members, Mr. Hazen, who resides in St. John and only uses the county to further his own personal ambitions, and Mr. Glasier, who while a very estimable man, is not of much account as a representative.

The men of Sunbury feel it a reproach to their intelligence that they should be represented in the legislature by a carpet bag politician like Mr. Hazen, who after his defeat for parliament in St. John where he lives, unloaded himself on Sunbury, and they propose in this election to send a couple of gentlemen from among themselves to sit for the constituency, and to support the government which Mr. Glasier publicly declares treated Sunbury in a most generous manner. Mr. Glasier has been able to show from the public accounts that during the past four years Sunbury has received nearly five times as much in the way of government grants as it formerly did, and a government that has treated the county so fairly is certainly entitled to its support in the legislature.

The government's supporters in Sunbury feel that they can redeem the county, and the right kind of a start to make will be the nomination at Thursday's convention of two gentlemen who enjoy the esteem and confidence of their fellow citizens. This done, we believe good organization and earnest work in the campaign right up to the close of the polls, will ensure a rattling victory for the government. There is no great adverse majority to overcome, such as we had in York in the last election, for Mr. Hazen and Mr. Glasier crept into the legislature by the skin of their teeth, and they can be defeated, if the proper men are secured as government candidates, and the friends of the government in the various parishes co-operate with that zeal and determination which have carried them to victory on many former occasions.

Mr. E. H. McAlpine, of St. John, will speak at Thursday's convention.

THE YORK CONVENTION.

The friends of the local government in York are much pleased with the popularity and strength which the administration enjoys among the electors of this constituency, and will rally in this city next Saturday afternoon in large numbers to name their candidates for the approaching election.

The convention will be held at the Y. M. C. A. hall, York street, at 2.30 o'clock, and the gentlemen then to be chosen will undoubtedly be York's next representatives in the legislature.

While the government is strong in the

county, and are assured of a victory, it will not do for apathy to take possession of the party. Elections have been lost many a time by over-confidence. The government's friends must organize in every party of the constituency, ready to meet any combination that may be brought against them, and must work earnestly and heartily till the close of the polls. Had the government party in Sunbury not been over-confident in the last election the opposition leader and his colleague would have been defeated. The gentlemen who may accept nomination in York, will do so at considerable personal sacrifice, and it will be due to them as well to the government that their chances before the electors shall not be jeopardized by the inertia of their own friends.

While we anticipate a signal government victory in York, we cannot afford to despise the enemy, who will take every possible advantage to secure defeat of the government ticket. We therefore urge on all the government's friends to be active in their support, and to first signalize their interest in the success of the government ticket by attending Saturday's nominating convention in goodly numbers. A good start will be the battle half won.

UNHEEDED ADVICE.

A few weeks ago the Sun was kindly intimating to Mr. Blair, that he should not identify himself with the local government in the elections, but the Minister of Railways is not accustomed to taking advice from that quarter, and so is billed to speak for the government at St. John on Friday evening. We expect that Mr. Blair will be able to render excellent service to the government during the campaign, and his numerous friends in the various constituencies will be glad to welcome him, and to hear his eloquent voice once more on the political stump.

Mr. Foster however will not be able to come to the assistance of his friends. He has quite a heavy job up in North Ontario, trying to persuade the electors of that constituency to elect him to parliament.

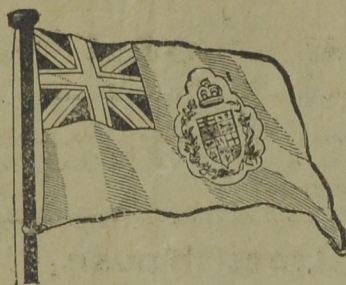
