"HIAWATHA."

J. Coleridge Taylor—"England's Most Characteristic Composer."

It is very seldom that a young composer under 28 years of age receives the distinction of being asked to compose works for the great musical festivals of England. Yet during the last four years the name of Coleridge Taylor has appeared with wonderful regularity at these great music-making.

Coleridge Taylor stands in the front rank of England's composers, and his cantata "Hiawatha's Wedding Feast" has been performed all over the British Islands and in over 100 cities in the United States.

The music of Hiawatha is truly wonderful; weird and fantastic to a degree, abounding in the most delightful melodies and thrilling harmonies. It is a composition that taxes to the utmost the technique of a choir—the least variation from absolute precision being at once noticeable. It is an unique work.

The Fredericton Festival Chorus purpose presenting this work on Wednesday, February 18, under the baton of its conductor, Mr. William D. Saunders, A. R. C. O., who will also sing "Hiawatha's Vision," taken from that portion of Longfellow's poem known as Hiawatha's Departure.

THE LAST SAD RITES.

Remains of the Late Dr. Seery Followed to the Grave by a Large Concurrence of People.

If anything was wanted to attest the esteem in which the late Dr. F. J. Seery was held in the community, it was furnished in the great concourse of representative citizens who turned out this morning despite the inclement weather to pay their tribute of respect to his mortal remains. The funeral took place from his late residence on Carleton street

at nine o'clock, and was attended by members of the C. M. B. A., the Victoria Hospital trustees, and hundreds of other citizens. The remains were taken to St. Dunstan's church where solemn high mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev. Father Carney, in the presence of a large congregation, the edifice being crowded to the doors. At the conclusion of the beautiful service, the rev. gentleman made a brief address in which he dwelt upon the uncertainty of life, and referred in feeling terms to the illness and death of the deceased physician, and invited all to offer prayers for the repose of his soul.

At the conclusion of the service the funeral cortege formed and proceeded up Brunswick street to the Hermitage, where the remains were laid to rest in the family lot.

The chief mourners were William E. Seery, James Dever, sr., James Dever, jr., Joseph and Jack Dever, Joseph McPeake and Frederick Ryan. The pall bearers were, Drs. G. McNally, G. C. Vanwart, B. M. Mallin, W. J. Weaver, J. W. Bridges and Roy McGrath. The floral offerings from friends of the deceased were very beautiful and completely covered the lid of the casket. Undertaker James D. Hanlon had charge of the funeral arrangements.

PROBATE COURT.

Will of the Late W. T. Estey Admitted to Probate—the Carten Estate.

The will of the late William T. Estey was admitted to probate on Saturday. The estate was sworn at \$9,600, of which \$300 represents real estate in the parish of Kingsclear and the balance personal property. Following is the list of the bequests:

The sum of \$100 is set aside to defray the cost of erecting a monument over the family lot in the Kingsclear cemetery. The residue of the estate, is to be divided equally between the three brothers and three sisters of the deceased. Messrs. B. R. Estey, W. P. Taylor and Thomas A. Estey are named as executors under the will.

Letters of administration in re the estate of the late William H. Carten were issued by Judge Barry out of the York Probate Court today, to the widow, M. s. Carten. The estate is valued at \$12,500, of which \$7,000 represents real estate and \$5,500 personal property. Mrs. W. H. Carten is sole executrix.

Death at Royal Road.

Patrick McQuade, who has made his home with Henry Carrie, of Royal Road, for a number of years, died this morning at the advanced age of 82. He was a native of Ireland and leaves a family of three sons, all residents of Houlton. George W. Adams has charge of the funeral arrangements.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.

St. Andrew's Man Dangerously Wounded by His Son—Dr. Atherton in Attendance.

A St. Andrews despatch on Sunday says: Wm McQuoid, manager of Sir William Van Horne's farm on Minister Island was accidentally shot at 12.30 today by the discharge of a rifle of 21 calibre, ball in the hands of his son Orville McQuoid, who is a strong, healthy man, after he was shot, walked unaided to his home, some 300 yards distant. Doctors Wade and Gove were called. They arrived at McQuoid's about 1.30 o'clock. On examination they found that the ball had entered McQuoid's left side between the tenth and eleventh ribs. They probed and found that the ball had penetrated the stomach. [The patient was spitting blood freely. After consultation the doctors decided to telephone Dr. Atherton of Fredericton to come by train Monday. The latest report from the patient is that he is bleeding internally and spitting blood profusely. His chances for recovery are considered slight.

[Dr. Atherton left this morning for St. Andrews to see what he can do to save McQuoid's life.

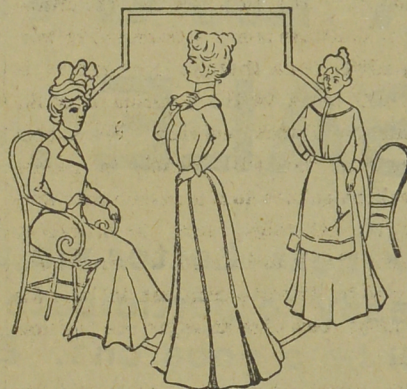
