The Herald publishes with pleasure today an eloquent sermon preached by Rev. Chas. R. McNally, in assuming charge of his new church at Brooklyn, N. Y. Mr. McNally, who is recognized as a most promising preacher, recently removed to Brooklyn from Lowell, Mass.

The Gamey debate in the Ontario legislature is closed, and the government motion to adopt the Judges' report confounding Gamey and declaring Provincial Secretary Stratton guiltless was adopted by a majority of four on a straight party vote.

A Halifax despatch confirms what the Herald has said respecting the intentions of the local government for the education of the deaf and dumb of New Brunswick. Premier Tweedie and Dr. Inch met the directors of the Halifax school yesterday, and the despatch adds that the New Brunswick government has practically decided to send the deaf and dumb to Halifax at the same rates as Nova Scotia children, viz.: \$165 per capita, \$75 from the municipality and \$90 from the government. [Premier Tweedie and Dr. Inch visited the Halifax school yesterday afternoon and expressed themselves well pleased with it.

The erratic "Billy" McLean, M. P., received a severe dressing down in parliament yesterday by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Blair in reply to charges that the Minister of Railways was influenced in his attitude to certain features of the railway bill relating to telephone companies because of his alleged interest in the Bell Telephone Company, through association with Mr. Sise, a co-director of the New Brunswick Telephone Company. The Premier's defence of Mr. Blair was spirited and to the point and the Minister of Railways also gave the Tory M. P. some warm comment. Mr. McLean will probably regret that he has been the means of circulating slanders against Mr. Blair.

Except the church manifests the life of Christ it is no true church, except it performs His mission it is not a church of the Redeemer. As the body is one and hath many members, and all the members of the body, being many, are one body, so also is the church. The body of Christ—one though many, unify in diversity. All the members are necessary in order that the symmetry may be complete; and its usefulness unimpaired.

Independence is the cry of our time— independence of the nation, independence of the individual. This spirit seen everywhere has found a large place in the church. Within limits this is well. Within limits, I say, for just as soon as individuality becomes obtrusive or obstinate, it has passed the limit where it can be of the most use to the world. Within the church this is especially true. It is one body—it is Christ in the world, each part must be in closest union with every other part. More and more the church must work together, more and more the denominations must work as one in manifesting the life of God to the world in the transformation and salvation of men.

You have before now seen a couple of pups get a hold of an old rope and then, as though life depended on the process, one pull one way while the other tugged the other. I have seen churches whose condition would not be inaptly illustrated by the dogs. Lack of unity in aim and effort is a great source of weakness to the church. The spirit of independence, good in itself, runs riot, until concerted action to a definite end is impossible. When independence thus errs against unity it is a curse rather than a blessing. All the members of the body must work together, vitalized by the heart,

directed by the head. One of the most beautiful sights in the world is a symmetrical and responsive human body. One of the most beautiful sights to the spiritual eye is the body of Christ—the church—harmoniously responsive to His thought and purpose. In the light of Christ's mission while incarnate in the flesh the church can make no mistake as to her mission. She must save souls. In the light of this purpose every petty difference should drop out of sight and the whole Christian body become one mind in regard to the chief aim of their existence. The educator will take care of the education of the community, the aesthetic will look after the culture, the reformer will lead reforms, but the church must save men from sin and manifest the life of God to the world.

I have seen in one of the great mills of our country two great wheels. Note one point, they fit each other, moving in ceaseless unison. If a single point be broken off, the machinery grates, if a number be broken, the wheel slips and the whole network of machinery is helpless. Each member of the church has his place. If he fails, the body is hampered in its efficiency.

But while there is to be union in diversity, there is also to be diversity in unity. Individuality is not effaced by the Gospel of Christ. This gives the widest possible scope to the churches' ties which may be included within the church. There is a place of usefulness for all. Each one is to find his or her place and then in union with the whole body work for its highest efficiency.

When the church of Christ awakens to a full consciousness of its status in the world, no longer will men call her sick. Within her borders there will be cries of joy over many sinners that have repented and tested the power of Christ to save. This church will realize her highest usefulness when she writes over her activities "We are the body of Christ—Christ incarnate in the present day—and severally we are members thereof."

A PARIS FAKE.

Report of British Disaster Promptly Denied.

Paris, June 27.—A despatch from Jibuti, Abyssinia, says that the Mad Mullah destroyed five British posts between Buero and Boheide in Somaliland. Thirty nine British officers out of forty-two white men were killed in the engagements, and 2,000 native soldiers were made prisoners.

London, June 27.—The war office announce they have received a despatch from Somaliland which enables them to deny the French story of the disaster to the British forces.

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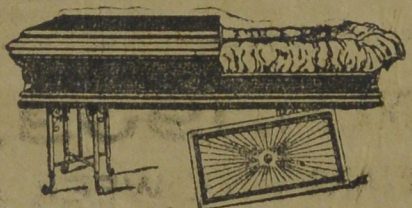
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
