NET FISHERMEN.

Scooping in Salmon of the Miramichi.

Mr. J. S. Neill returned last night from a fishing trip to the Miramichi, and although he did not get any salmon he managed to secure a goodly number of sea trout. He says the salmon have not yet come up the river and also that not many are likely to if the net fishing at Loggieville and other points at the mouth of the river is not restricted.

The nets at these points stretch a great distance across the river and are not taken up at any time during

the week to allow the fish to pass up river. Not only the grown salmon but even the grilse are fished out in this way. If this is allowed to continue the Upper Miramichi will be altogether out of the salmon fisheries.

BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

A Successful Year--Mission Board with Money in the Treasury.

The fifty-fourth annual session of the New Brunswick Western Baptist Association convened Friday afternoon at Marysville. Rev. N. B. MacDonald, the veteran pastor of Queens county, preached with old time strength and vigor the opening sermon. The following were invited to seats:—Prof. C. C. Jones, Pa.D. Acadia University; Rev. J. W. Manning, D. D., E. M. Sipprell, of St. John; Rev. Messrs. Crisp and Rideout of Marysville. Officers were chosen as follows: Moderator, M. S. Hall; Clerk, Rev. B. S. Freeman, B. A., Assist. Clerk, Rev. Z. L. Fash, M. A., Treasurer C. A. Smith.

The first order of business was the presentation of the Home Mission report which was a deliverance of unusual interest and hopefulness. The report says in part: "The situation in which your board finds itself is hopeful, and the outlook is promising. A reference to the report of our treasurer shows a large amount of money on hand. This, with legacies which will be paid in during the year, and further contributions from the Twentieth Century Fund, together with the regular offering of the churches, presents a most encouraging aspect from a financial standpoint. The board was fortunate enough to secure the service of Rev. W. E. McIntyre, late of Chipman, N. B., as Field Secretary and Superintendent. This appointment gives general satisfaction. The special depressing feature of the work is the lack of men to prosecute the work to make the sacrifices which this Home Missions fields entail." The solution of this question led to a most interesting discussion. The work of the general missionary, Rev. A. H. Hayward, was greatly appreciated. A friend and admirer of his devotion to such interests has made a most generous offer to the board in which he proposes to become responsible for a part of Mr. Hayward's salary for the ensuing year. This generous friend withholds his name even from the members of the board; but though unknown the report commends his generosity to other men of ample means as worthy of imitation.

At the evening meeting, which was largely attended, addresses were delivered by Rev. W. E. McIntyre and Dr. Manning.

Saturday a m. session was devoted to Sunday school work. Rev. W. E. McIntyre, J. A. Cahill, Prof. C. C. Jones, Rev. Z. L. Fash, Rev. Mr. Russell of London, Eng., Rev. J. H. MacDonald, Wm. Swim, ex-M.P.P., C. H. Colwell, E. M. Sipprell and Rev. W. R. Robinson were the speakers. Missionary work received the attention of the convention this afternoon. Rev. J. W. Manning, D.D., Rev. A. H. Hayward and others addressed the meeting.

This evening an educational meeting will be held with Dr. Creed, Rev. J. H. MacDonald, Prof. C. C. Jones as principal speakers.

This morning a vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Alex Gibson for permitting the delegates to travel on the suburban Canada Eastern free of charge.

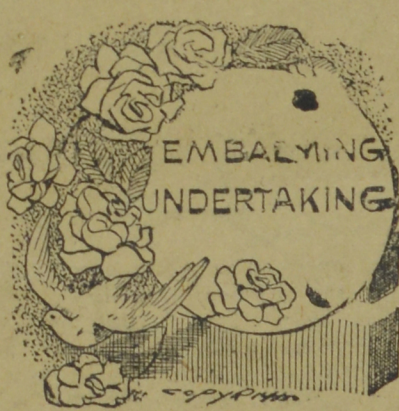
