Sir Frederick Borden, the Canadian minister of militia, seems to have got about all the concessions he sought from the British war office, besides something for himself which he did not seek or anticipate. He has been made a member of the Imperial defence committee.

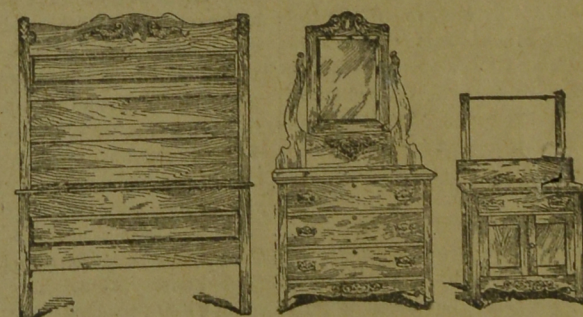
