The River.

The steamer Majestic arrived here from St. John about six o'clock last evening with a large cargo of freight. She encountered considerable ice between here and Gagetown but found the river comparatively clear below that point. After unloading here the steamer sailed again at seven o'clock for St. John. It was the intention of the captain only to go as far as the Reach last night.

The steamer Victoria, which left here on Thursday evening, did not reach St. John until ten o'clock yesterday morning.

Philadelphia Visitors.

Meessrs. Joseph L. Ekinon and Zettedee Haines, two members of the Society of Friends, of Philadelphia, arrived this morning and are guests at the Barker. They left Philadelphia three months ago to visit the Indians of the New England states and the maritime provinces, to hold meetings in their midst, and generally to inquire into their welfare. The visitors called on Indian Commissioner Farrell and in company with him made a trip this afternoon to the Indian reserve at St. Mary's. They will remain here till Monday.

St. Mary's Man Injured.

Albert Ryan of St. Mary's had his shoulder blade broken yesterday afternoon. The injured man who is a well known painter, was working at the new residence of Mrs. G. A. Lounsbury, corner of St. John and Brunswick streets, when the ladder on which he was working slipped, and he was thrown a distance of nearly twenty feet to the ground below. Mr. Ryan was conveyed to Victoria Hospital, and Drs. Atherton and McGrath were called in. They found that the unfortunate man had his shoulder blade broken but could not determine as yet whether he had received other injuries or not.

Today's Market.

The market this morning was a fairly large one and most kinds of country produce sold at good prices. Poultry of all kinds, except ducks, was very plentiful and notwithstanding the high prices which prevailed, sold quickly. Plump geese brought from 75 to 80 cents and chickens were carried off for 55 and 65 cents per pair though some extra good ones brought as high as 70 cents. Some turkeys brought 15 cents per pound though some old stagers went at fourteen. A few carcasses of beef were sold at 5 and 6 cents by the quarter. Eggs were firm at 25 cents and butter in prints sold at 22 and 23 cents. Lamb remained at 6 to 8 but there is very little coming in now. Turnips can be bought for 50 cents and carrots at 80 cents by the barrel. Potatoes were selling at \$1.00 per barrel

and were scarce even at that price. The market prices for all kinds of country produce seem to be keeping up wonderfully, though many things are not so high as a couple of weeks ago.

GOVERNMENT MEETING.

Asylum Matters Discussed Yesterday—Meeting Again Today.

The local government had a meeting in St. John yesterday afternoon, but no business was transacted. In the evening another session was held, when consideration was given to a report submitted by Dr. J. B. Travers, the acting superintendent of the Provincial Lunatic Asylum, with respect to the management of the institution and increased accommodation. Dr. Travers suggested changes in the wards and improvements in the furniture equipment, and advised certain things being done in the basement. Sewerage improvements were also included as well as other like matters.

A committee composed of Hons. L. J. Tweedie, C. H. Labllois and H. A. McKeown was appointed to deal with the report, examine into the matters mentioned and report to the next meeting of the government at Fredericton, with recommendations.

The executive council resumed business this morning.

A NOTED MISSIONARY.

Rev. J. Cooper Robinson in the City—His Services.

The Rev. J. Cooper Robinson, who went to Japan 15 years ago as the first foreign missionary sent out by the Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada, will preach at the Parish Church (St. Ann's) tomorrow morning, and at the Cathedral in the evening.

On Monday he will deliver a lecture at the Church Hall, illustrated by 60 beautifully colored lantern views of Japan and its people. All are cordially invited to attend. A collection will be taken for Missionary work. Lecture begins at 8 p. m.

Rev. Mr. Robinson arrived from the west at noon, and is the guest of Rev. Dean Partridge.

An Interesting Lecture.

Mr. L. Lee Street, C. E., resident engineer of the Boston subway, lectured before the engineering society at the U. N. B. library last evening. The subject which was work connected with his present professional operations at Boston, was well presented and proved very interesting especially to the large number of engineering students present. Mr. A. K. Grimmer, the president of the engineering society, presided. After the lecture a number of the gentlemen present discussed the subject of the lecture. Mr. Street, who has made a decided success of his profession, is a graduate of the U. N. B., and a son of Collector Street of this city.

An Important Suit.

The case of J. J. Hale vs. Tobique Manufacturing Co., for a balance on account of \$3,270 came up in the Carleton Circuit Court this week. Among the witnesses for the plaintiff were Hon. Jas. Holly and Alex. Holly of St. John. The plaintiff was on the stand a long time. The defence called no witnesses. The judge gave the jury a number of questions to answer. One of the main questions was whether a survey of lumber at the boom in Fredericton, or the survey of the Hollis in St. John, was to be relied on, the plaintiff contending the latter. The questions were all answered in favor of the plaintiff, and the judge ordered a verdict entered for \$3,265 26.

Funerals.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Nettie Quartermain will take place at 1:30 o'clock on Sunday afternoon from her late home Woodstock road. Rev. J. H. Macdonald will conduct the services.

The funeral of the late John McNamara took place at 9 o'clock this morning. The remains were taken to St. Dunstan's church where High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by Rev. Father Carney. Interment was made at the Hermitage.

The remains of the three months old baby girl of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Shea, who died yesterday, were interred at the Hermitage at two thirty p. m. today.

WHAT ABOUT A CANNING FACTORY?

The Hoegg Co. Looking for a Chance in Sussex.

Sussex Record: Another promising industry bids fair at an early date to find itself established in Sussex. During the present week, the managing director of the D. W. Hoegg Co., Limited, Mr. Geo. W. Hoegg of Fredericton, has been looking around here with a view to establishing a plant. This firm are New Brunswick's largest canners and preservers of fruits and are at present operating factories at Sheffield, Sanbury Co., and Woodstock. Their lines consist mainly of corn, peas, beans, tomatoes, pumpkins, squash and in a smaller way, carrots, parsnips, apples and strawberries. Their reputation is that of all A 1 goods; they are unable to meet their orders and, as Woodstock was not proven to be good working territory, that portion of the business will be transferred if arrangements can be made.

We hope to see an effort put forth to secure this additional industry. It is more than likely that our farmers will be asked at an early date to figure on contracts, as the matter of supply, becomes the first consideration. A member of the company may also be asked to attend the annual agricultural society meeting on Dec. 1st, as whatever is done must be done soon.

Mr. Hoegg returned to Fredericton on Wednesday's C. P. R., but the matter is in the hands of interested local parties.

In all probability this concern, if it decides to locate in Sussex, will ask for exemption from taxation, which is a matter worth careful and immediate consideration.

DEATH OF AN M. P. P.

Mr. Gagnon of Madawaska, Passed Away After Lengthy Illness.

M. Narcisse A. Gagnon, M. P. P. for Madawaska, died at his home at St. Basil in that county, yesterday, after an illness of several months.

Mr. Gagnon was born in Quebec about 69 years ago and was for years a school teacher. Later on he opened up a general store at St. Basil and was reported to be in good circumstances. Mr. Gagnon was elected the election before the last along with Feé Laforest, and the last time he and Thomas Clair were the successful candidates. The deceased gentleman was warden for years of Madawaska county and was during his illness elected to represent St. Basil in the council. Mr. Gagnon married a sister of Levi e Theriault, who for years was a representative for Madawaska. Mr. Gagnon left no children.

Premier Tweedie and the other members of the government sent a telegram of condolence to the widow, and Hon. Mr. Labllois will represent the government at the funeral, which takes place on Tuesday morning next.

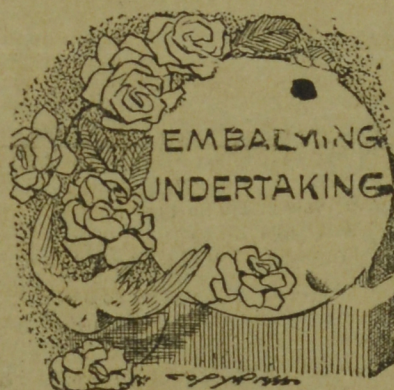
