FOUGHT WITH ROBERTS.

Death of a Canadian Officer With a Dis-
tinguished Record.

Toronto, March 5.—Lieut. Col. Jarvis, late of the 69th Hampshire Regiment, a Canadian officer who had seen most distinguished and exciting service in the British army, died here last night, aged 61.

He entered the 100th Royal Canadian Regiment in 1859, but was transferred to the 69th in 1862. He served with the Red Cross Ambulance Corps through the Franco Prussian war and received from the French government one of the gold crosses granted.

He was in the Afghan war, 1878 to 1880, marched with Roberts to Candahar, and was frequently mentioned in the despatches and for gallantry. At Candahar he received his brevet majority. He retired from the army in 1882.

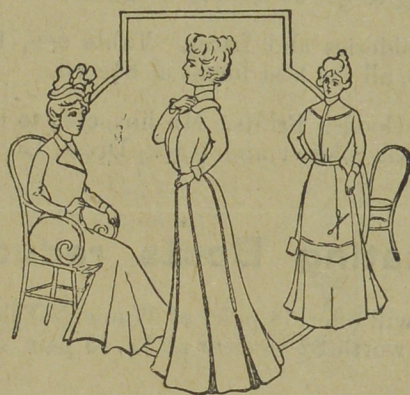
