ICE SPORTS BEGIN.

Hockey, Skating and Ice Yachting in High Favor Just Now.

Ice sportsmen are now in the full flush of the winter's fun. Everywhere in the rinks and on the lakes and rivers hockey matches and skating races are events of daily and nightly occurrence.

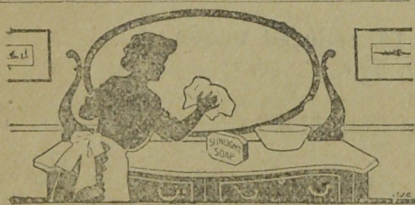
It always requires a distinct effort for me to pass a pin that I see lying on the sidewalk, because of that absurdly bad rhyme, which of course I consider nonsense.
