A Practical, Unanswerable Speech in Defence of the Government.

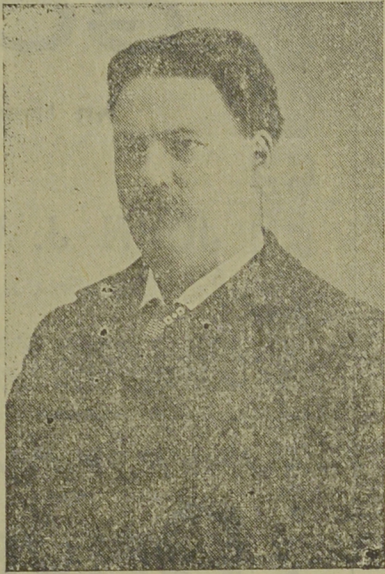
GREAT SUCCESS OF THE AGRICULTURAL POLICY

Mr. Morrison's Criticisms of the Administration.

MR. CARPENTER DISPLAYS EXCELLENT DEBATING POWER.

Mr. King, on resuming the debate on the address in the legislature Thursday, congratulated the member for Northumberland who had spoken Wednesday on the fishery question, but thought that some of his statements would not bear a very close scrutiny. If we are entitled to a million of the Halifax award it was no defence against our claim for interest for the last twenty-five years that the government of Canada had been giving the amount of that interest yearly in bounties to the fishermen of Nova Scotia. Of the fishery bounties Nova Scotia received \$100,000 annually and New Brunswick only \$13,000. The interest of \$1,000,000 would be at least \$40,000 a year, so that there would be \$27,000 a year coming to us for interest, over and above the amount paid to our fishermen in bounties, even if we admitted that the Dominion government had the right to take our money to pay bounties. The leader of the opposition admits that this province has a strong case in its claim to a share of the Halifax award. Indeed every lawyer who has looked into the matter admits that our claim is unanswerable. It therefore only becomes a question whether we should enforce that claim. We, as trustees of the people, would be neglecting our duties if we did not do so. It is the duty of the government to press this claim in the strongest manner possible. He had listened with interest to the speech of the member for Charlotte (Grimmer) when he was dealing with the mining and agricultural policy of the government.

With regard to the complaints made by him in reference to the mining leases, he thought it rather singular that if the hon. gentleman's clients were prepared to expend £50,000 in exploring and £350,000 for work they should be held up by a petty demand for \$500. This matter was heard before the surveyor general. He had read the evidence and it appeared from it that Mr. Todd had only been in possession of the property for about twelve months, while the other parties had held it for eight years. It therefore seemed to be reasonable that the surveyor general, before making these leases void, should give Mr. Todd nine months more in which to develop the minerals. As to the agricultural policy of the government he had stated that \$23,000 was spent for agricultural purposes in 1878, while only \$800 was paid in salaries. He would hardly pretend to say that the agricultural state of the province was better in 1878 than it is now. In that year there was not a cheese or butter factory in New Brunswick and butter and cheese had to be imported from Quebec and Ontario. In 1901 the butter and cheese factories established by the government made \$341,000 worth of butter and cheese, and not only was the home market supplied but we were able to export \$208,000 worth of these articles. All this magnificent product had been built up by the policy of the government. In 1899 in the parish of Sussex the government built a dairy school. The first year it produced \$8,000 worth of dairy products, the second year \$18,000 worth the third year \$28,000 worth and the last \$41,000 worth. This year the product will be close to \$60,000 worth.

Mr. King is a native of Sussex and by profession a lawyer. He has been warden of Kings, was first elected to the legislature in the bye election of 1901, and was re-elected in 1903. A bachelor, Liberal and Episcopalian.

All this has been built up without interfering in the least with the milk business, and the prosperity of Kings county has been greatly increased in consequence of this policy. It does not follow that the money paid in salaries is wasted. There has been no expenditure more productive of benefit than for the dairy superintendents, who are educating our farmers into better methods. The member for Northumberland, who first spoke, complained that the seed wheat imported by the government produced buckwheat. It was a characteristic of old and worn out land to produce such a crop, and that must have been the reason why the seed wheat to which he referred failed. The wheat policy of the government, although bitterly attacked, had been a great success. In 1899 there was not a modern roller mill in the province; today we have twenty-one roller mills, and the crop of wheat last year was very nearly half a million bushels.

Something had been said in regard to the horse importations, and one of the Northumberland members had stated that one of the horses imported had developed spavin. This gentleman was unable to name the horse and in fact no such thing had occurred. The seven horses imported by the government were three Clydesdales, two French coach horses, a hackney and a thoroughbred. The Clydesdales were selected for heavy hauling, because they were thought to be the best breed of heavy horses for that purpose. The coach horses and hackney were to improve the stock of general utility horses, and the thoroughbred was wanted in the county of Kings. All these horses were perfectly sound when imported, having been examined by competent veterinary surgeons, and there was not a mark on one of them except a spic and a scratch which one of them had received in jumping a fence. It was admitted by all who saw them that they were the best lot of horses ever imported into New Brunswick. The horse which the member for Northumberland referred to as having developed a spavin was a chestnut purchased by Col. Montgomery Campbell and controlled by him and Mr. G. H. Barnes, both strong opponents of the government. He doubted whether it would be safe for the member for Northumberland to tell these gentlemen that their horse was spavined. If he had received any injury he had received it in their hands and while under their control. The best reports are coming to the department of agriculture today concerning all the horses. The leader of the opposition has stated that the government was derelict in its duty when it purchased Galloway for \$1500, because he contended Talamack, a better horse, could have been bought for \$400. Talamack was owned in the province and the committee were delegated to import horses; and he ventured to say that there was not a horseman who would deny that the importation was in the best interests of the province.

One of the members for Northumberland had stated that the government was sustained on account of Mr. Ball's efforts

in the campaign. The opposition seem to think it perfectly right that they should have the support of the Conservative party. Why then find fault because the government has the assistance of federal friends? It had been claimed that the election in Kings was not run on local lines. Nothing else was discussed. The campaign was conducted on the record of the government alone.

It had been stated that the government's policy was not aggressive. The mining, lumber and agricultural policies of the government were sufficient evidences of aggressiveness, and indicated a desire on the part of the government to do all they possibly could to assist and develop the various industries of the province. That the electors think so was emphatically shown on the 28th of February last.

MR. MORRISON

said it was not his intention to make extended remarks. He took issue with the contention that the province was entitled to interest on the Halifax award. How can we expect interest when the fishermen have been receiving bounties all these years. The attorney general had stated that a case for the courts to decide would probably be agreed upon. Judging from the attitude of the minister of justice the probability was remote, for he appears to be opposed to the idea of the provinces receiving the money. It would seem to him that the interests of the province would be better conserved by leaving the control of the fisheries in the hands of the Federal authorities. The province in the event of receiving the award would have to create a fishery department and this it cannot very well afford to do.

Regarding the horse importation it seemed to him that a committee to purchase these horses should have been selected from practical men.

GOLD FOR THE BANKS.

Montreal April 2.—The Canadian Express Company brought into Montreal from New York this morning seven kegs of gold, each weighing it was said, about 120 lbs. for delivery to certain banks.
