Gordon Brown officiated as referee and gave thorough satisfaction.

While the ice was such as to interfere with real fast play, the game was not without interesting points. It was one-sided, however, the Rothesay boys scoring two goals in the first half and three in the last half, the U. N. B. failing to score. Rothesay has a good team, their forwards show plenty of snap and ginger, realize the advantage of playing a tame game, and pass well. They have not overlooked a point that some of the senior teams might improve upon, viz., shooting. The Freshmen from the University, a splendid, healthy lot of young gentlemen, played hard to win, but were badly handicapped by lack of experience. They have little opportunity for practice, but showed up in fair form. Their play was inclined to be independent and showed a lack of confidence, the forwards failing to follow up, or take the aggressive.

TODAY'S ELECTION.

Quiet Around the City Polls.

There was very little excitement around the city polls today, everything being carried on in an orderly manner and without the usual bitterness of election contests.

At the court house: Candidate McLeod was in evidence most of the day, and Mr. Whitehead took an occasional look in to see how things were going. The government workers seemed to have it largely their own way. At the city hall the opposition put up a much stiffer fight.

Up to three o'clock 602 votes had been polled at the City Hall out of a possible 976, while at the Court House the number polled was about 500.

At the Court House, Wm. White and Michael Moore looked after the interests of the government candidates, and Thos. Wandless and Frank Smith were the agents for the opposition.

At the City Hall the agents for the government candidates were, James Bell, John Tonar, Stanley Ebbett and W. McAndrews, while Wm. Carrie, F. Delong Arthur Limerick and Chas. Fleet attended to the similar duties for the opposition.

Killed Five Women.

Hamilton, Ohio, Feb. 28.—Five murders, the victims of which were all women, and two of them are wives, is the revolting record of Albert Knapp, given today in a sworn confession before Mayor Bosch. He is also believed to have murdered three other women. Knapp, according to the police, is a degenerate of a pronounced type. The murder of his third wife, Annie Goddard Knapp, which led to his arrest yesterday at Indianapolis, was done for no apparent reason.

Notice of Legislation.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a Bill will be introduced at the next session of the legislature of New Brunswick, to amend the Victoria, Chapter 33 of the Acts of the General Assembly of New Brunswick, "An Act to continue the Fredericton Boom Company and to consolidate and amend the several acts relating to the said Company" and amending Acts, so as

(1) To provide for an increase of from twelve to 15 per cent in the tolls collected on the Lumber and Timber rafted by the Company and for additional tolls on small lumber and timber not provided for by present acts.

(2) To provide that other good and substantial fastenings may be substituted for the use of Boom Poles.

(3) To repeal Section ten of the said Act and substitute therefor tolls upon the logs, timber and other lumber coming out of the Keswick River.

(4) To authorize the Company to enter into a contract with the Saint John River Log Driving Company or any other corporation or person having authority to make such contract for the driving of the logs coming down the River Saint John.
