A DEADLOCK.

People generally had hoped that the last of the Goodspeed case was heard when the Chief Justice sentenced the lad to the Reformatory, but it appears that the question is still to drag itself along, perhaps in the form of another lawsuit.

The Reformatory is under the direction of a committee of which the Mayor of St. John is chairman, and it is necessary to secure his signature to a warrant before a prisoner can be received at the institution. Mayor White refuses to give his permission, claiming that Goodspeed is too hardened a criminal to be mixed up with the present inmates of the Reformatory and in this stand he is backed up by the governing board. The law says the mayor "may" sign the warrant, which is interpreted by His Worship to be permissive and not obligatory. Recorder Skinner advises that the matter be referred to the Supreme Court, and there the matter hangs for the present. It is said that if Goodspeed is not soon removed to the Reformatory it will be open to his counsel to move for his release from jail, and that there is a possibility of his getting free.

In the meantime there seems to be general regret that the culprit was not sentenced to the penitentiary instead of the Reformatory, regret in which the Chief Justice joins.

We understand that members of the Exhibition Association will interview the Municipal Council and ask for a county grant of \$1,000 towards the exhibition to be held here next autumn, and it is to be hoped that the councillors will deal with the matter in a generous spirit. Much of the benefit of the exhibition will go to the county, and the amount of the grant to be asked is not an unreasonable one.

The collector of customs at Port Hawkesbury, N. S. announced himself as a candidate for the mayoralty of that town, and was promised an unopposed return, but the Minister of the department has intimated to the aspirant that it is against the rules for officials under him to hold municipal offices.

Journalism has lost a bright representative by the death of Julian Ralph, whose sketches of the South African war will be well remembered. He passed away Tuesday night at New York.

DEATH OF SENATOR WOOD.

One of Canada's Merchant Princes and a Prominent Liberal.

Hamilton, Jan. 21.—Hon. Andrew T. Wood, a member of the Senate, died this morning, aged 76. He was one of the merchant princes of Canada, being engaged in hardware business as a member of the firm of Wood, Vallance & Co., and was also largely interested in the cotton and iron manufacturing business. He was a native of Armagh Co., Ireland, but came to Canada when a youth. He accumulated great wealth and was a member of the syndicate that offered to construct the C. P. R. in 1881. He sat for Hamilton in the House of Commons 1874-78, and again 1896 to 1900 when he was appointed to the Senate. A Liberal in politics and in religion a Presbyterian.

MARYSVILLE NEWS.

Jan. 21.—What might have been a serious fire broke out shortly after seven o'clock yesterday morning in the dry room, which is situated in the annex of the cotton mill. The flames rapidly gained headway among the dry cotton but the department was soon closed off from the other part of the mill and with the assistance of the employees and a strong force of water the conflagration was soon under control. The men who worked like beavers and the water being plentiful very little damage was done. There are several reports as to how the fire started, the most likely one being that it caught by some dry cotton coming in contact with electric light thus causing the suddenness of the outbreak. The smoke was very dense and made the fire hard to locate, but in less than half an hour everything was running along as if nothing had happened.

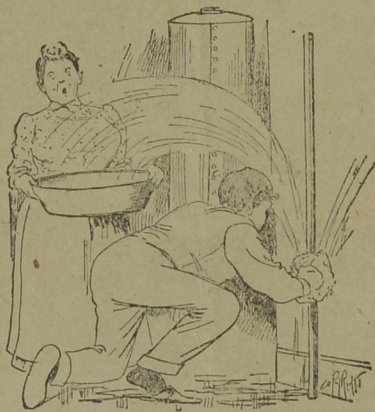

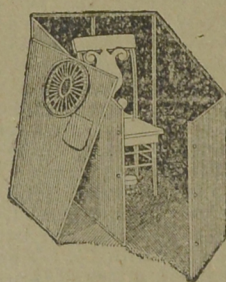
