THE SUN'S BAD BREAK.

Yesterday the Herald hazarded the opinion that the Sun's Ottawa telegram declaring that Premier Tweedie, Attorney General Pugsley and Solicitor General McKeown were at Ottawa exerting their influence to prevent Mr. Emmerson's admission to the federal cabinet, was a pure concoction, a malicious invention of the Sun's very unreliable correspondent at the capital.

When the Sun's despatch was sent and published, Premier Tweedie was at his home in Chatham, Dr. Pugsley was in St. John, within easy reach of the Sun office, and Mr. McKeown was on his way from Toronto to Montreal, so that the falsehood was indeed a very clumsy one.

Not only were the gentlemen named hundreds of miles from Ottawa when the Sun's despatch was penned, but it is well known that all of them are strongly in favor of Mr. Emmerson being called to the cabinet. Indeed the member for Westmorland is practically the unanimous choice of Maritime Liberals for the position, and he is about as sure of it as a man can possibly be of anything in this world.

The Sun makes no explanation or apology for its bad break, and its readers may be excused if hereafter they take little stock in its political sensations from Ottawa.

BORDEN'S SOMERSAULTS.

Mr. Borden, the Tory leader has jumped the fence in more than one particular on the railway question. While bound by public opinion to declare for another transcontinental railway, he has abandoned the Tory opposition to government owned railways, and now favors the extension of the Intercolonial to Georgian Bay, and the expropriation of a section of the C. P. R. Mr. Borden has also reversed his attitude towards the late minister of railways, as was well shown by Mr. Roche of Halifax in the debate in parliament.

During the last election Mr. Borden denounced Mr. Blair from every platform in the constituency as the enemy of Halifax and the opponent of the best interests of its people. Today his tune is changed. Mr. Blair's course is extolled and the leader of the opposition only crossed the floor of the House to congratulate the ex-minister of railways at the conclusion of his attack on the government policy. Mr. Borden is now ostensibly a valiant champion of the I. C. R., but in 1900 he and his colleague were advocates of a policy that meant the handing over of the I. C. R. to the C. P. R. Mr. Roche well said the I. C. R. was for the people and not for the C. P. R. Estimating the cost of Mr. Borden's hop step and jump line, Mr. Roche said that it would total the enormous sum of \$247,000,000.

The Telegram attempts to cast doubt on the Fredericton bear story, which is rather mean, seeing that the St. John money yarn was generally accepted as truth. There were no unpleasant results however in the bear episode, nobody was arrested for torturing the animal, and the government did not have to interfere to secure the bear's liberty. It was different in the case of the St. John mouse.

Coal is being shipped from the Minto mine by rail, a point fifteen miles this side of Chipman, to St. John.

Mr. Foster is still looking for a safe Tory constituency, but they are mighty scarce these days.

In his speech in the railway debate Sir Richard Cartwright said that Canada had expended about \$100,000,000 worth on the C. P. R. for the avowed purpose of colonizing the northwest and what was the result? In 1896 the settlement of the northwest had about completely stopped, emigration had to come to a standstill, the homestead entries were 1,340 in that year and last year 31,383.

Hon. H. A. McKeown who has seen Hon. A. G. Blair at Murray Bay, says that the ex-minister refused to discuss the political situation. Mr. Blair arrived at Ottawa last night.

The farmers are not grumbling any more about the prospective failure of the crops. The earth is yielding her fruits in abundance.
