The Game Season.

The open season for shooting ducks, woodcock and snipe, commences on Tuesday, September 1st. The open season for moose, caribou and deer, does not commence until September 15th. The shooting of partridges is prohibited for two years.

Smallpox in Victoria.

Six cases of genuine smallpox are reported from Lansdowne, Victoria Co., in the family of Marshall Donnelly. The house is under strict quarantine, and there is little likelihood of the disease spreading. The malady can be directly traced to Millinocket, Maine, where there have been several cases.

The Cathedral.

A neat little booklet of some twenty five pages has just been issued in connection with next week's semi-centennial anniversary exercises at the Cathedral. It gives a very interesting history of the inception, construction and consecration of the Cathedral, and is on sale at the city book stores for ten cents a copy.

Deadly Cholera Infantum.

Waldo Allen, the little son of Mr. and Mrs. William N. Griever, died at the home of his parents at Marysville last night, after a short illness from cholera infantum, aged 1 year and 5 months. The funeral took place at three o'clock this afternoon, with services by Rev. R. S. Crisp. Interment was made at the rural cemetery, R. B. Adams undertaker.

A Long Tramp.

Messrs. A. H. Brownell and A. C. Booth of East Orange, New Jersey, and F. W. Kreps of Newark, N. J., arrived in the city by boat from St. John on Wednesday and registered at Windsor Hall. They left their baggage at the hotel and set out at eight o'clock yesterday morning to walk to Woodstock. They expect to reach their destination in time to return to the city by train on Saturday.

The Victoria Mill.

Scott Brothers, who lately acquired the Victoria mill, intend to make quite extensive repairs and improvements to the same in the near future. The building will be repainted, a new planer and edger will be put in, and a patent "haul up" for transferring the logs from the river to the mill will be introduced. The Messrs Scott expect to start sawing early next spring.

A Distinguished Visitor.

Mr. M. D. Pride, a leading citizen of the flourishing town of Amherst, N. S., and president and manager of the Amherst Boot & Shoe Manufacturing Company, one of the largest and most prosperous industries in the maritime provinces, arrived in the city by the noon train today and is a guest at the Queen. He is on his way home from a business

trip to the upper provinces, and his visit to Fredericton is partly for pleasure and partly for business. This afternoon in company with his old friend, Rev. J. H. MacDonald, a former pastor of the Amherst Baptist church, Mr. Pride paid a visit to the shoe factory and Palmer's tannery, and afterwards enjoyed a drive about the city. It is Mr. Pride's first visit to Fredericton, and of course his views are in accord with the general verdict of strangers, that it is one of the most beautiful spots on the continent. Mr. Pride will return home tomorrow morning.

Howe will Do.

A Montreal despatch says: Tommy Howe, the St. John, N. B., third baseman, signed by the Montreal Eastern league team, has made a favorable impression in the two games he has played since joining the team. In Thursday's game he accepted eight out of nine chances, some of them difficult, and while he hit the ball hard failed to land safely. Howe will be taken on the trip with the team, leaving Friday night. The impression is that he will do.

The Montreal Star's report of Wednesday's game says: "Howe, the new man from New Brunswick, played third base for the first time and proved a decided acquisition. He fielded his position well, is full of life, and as ambitious as an American heiress among the aristocracy. He led the batting streak which captured the game, and handles the stick like a man who had some idea where he meant to put the ball when he hit it, instead of smacking wildly and trusting to wind and weather."

Police Court.

A fifteen year old boy whose name and speech indicated that he had not been long out from England, was before the police court this morning charged with having a loaded revolver in his possession. He acknowledged the offence, but pleaded in justification of his conduct that he was a stranger here and did not know that it was a violation of the law to carry a shooting iron. The boy told Col. Marsh that he had followed the sea for several years, and in proof of his statement, he was able to show ship's discharge papers, which gave him a high recommendation. The revolver was impounded by the police magistrate and the boy was allowed to go with a caution. The boy's bright manner so impressed a city alderman that he promised to procure him a situation in the city.

A Student's Illness.

Tuesday forenoon Mr. Libere Voutour, of Legere Corner, received a telegram from the Principal of the Normal school, Fredericton, informing him of the serious illness of his daughter, Hermeline, who is attending that institution. Mr. and Mrs. Voutour left that afternoon by the C P R for Fredericton to be at the bedside of their daughter.—Moncton Transcript. Dr. Vanwart was the physician in attendance on Miss Govang, and he did not consider an operation necessary.]

Bondfield, the Bible Society representative in China. Both gentlemen are daily expected to arrive in Boston on one of the Cunard steamers and will address our citizens on Thursday, 3rd September. The privilege of listening to these distinguished gentlemen will be appreciated by our citizens. Mr. Bondfield sails from Vancouver for China at the conclusion of the Canadian tour.

Good Hay Weather.

The continued fine weather is being greatly appreciated by the farmers who are carrying on hay making operations on the islands near Springhill. Wet weather at the commencement of the season greatly retarded the work, but the prospects are now that the bulk of the island hay will be housed in the course of a few days. The crop is reported to be a heavy one, and the hay is of an exceptional good quality.

Delighted Visitors

Dr. J. D. Ross of Moncton, his sister Miss Ross, of Truro, N. S., and their niece, Miss Howe and Miss L. Ross of Dartmouth, N. S. arrived in the city by boat yesterday, and registered at the Barker. The party visited Fredericton last year, and were so delighted with their trip, that they could not resist returning this season. They left for St. John by boat this morning.

Instantly Killed.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 27.—Yesterday Aaron Allen, his son Benjamin, and a lad named Smith, left Yarmouth in a sail boat for Tusket Islands on a gunning trip. They went ashore to gather wood, Smith carrying a gun. Returning, Smith led the way and in putting the gun in the boat put it butt end first. The gun discharged, the bullet entering young Allen's heart, killing him instantly. He was immediately behind Smith. He was taken to Chebogue Point, where an inquest was held.

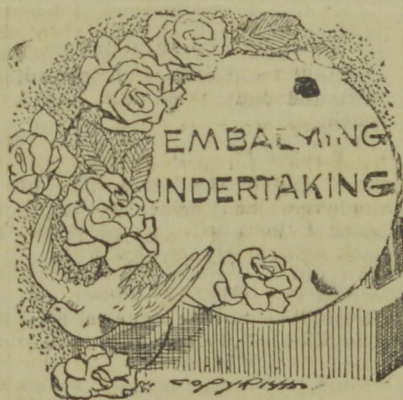
