##### HARVEY STATION.

(Special Correspondence to the Herald.)

Feb. 24.—The opposition meeting here last evening was addressed by candidates Robison, Young and McLeod and was fairly well attended. Robison spoke first and dealt chiefly with municipal affairs. He was not satisfied with the government method of appointing health officers nor the way the officers had handled the York smallpox bills, although he admitted that the officers had cut down the bill-

largely. He also charged the government with favoritism in the Marsten case.

Mr. Young spoke briefly; he did not like the way the finances of the province were handled and denounced the government for increasing the debt but did not give any reasons why the debt was increased.

H. F. McLeod spoke over an hour. He waxed very eloquent and indignant over the great wrongs and burdens which he alleged that the people were groaning under. He did not do much toward making specific charges against the government but dealt in generalities and made a fierce attack upon Attorney General Pogsley, charging him with neglect of duty and helping himself from the provincial treasury. Those charges he did not prove. He also brought up the matter of the Fort Kent dam charges seeming to forget that those charges had been exploded sometime ago. Mr. McLeod is a fine talker but he did not seem to make any converts. At the close Duncan Thomas of Fredericton appeared on the scene. He mounted the platform and threw out a large amount of taffy. He talked of the sturdy independence and mental and physical ability of the Harvey people, he spread it on very thick and sweet and some were fascinated with it. He made a fierce onslaught on the government and made numerous charges of wrong doing which he did not prove. He knew all about agriculture and knew that the agricultural policy of the government was a farce. He forgot to mention the great impetus that policy had given to wheat and stock raising throughout the province. All the speakers got a good hearing, but failed to create any enthusiasm.
