KNOWLTON'S CAMP.

(Special Correspondence to the Herald.)

Feb. 25.—I take this opportunity to inform the readers of your paper of the life we are living in the Tobique woods.

We are working on Two Brooks, about eight miles from the settlement. Our boss, Ed. Knowlton is a native of this place. He is a fine fellow and very popular with the men.

We are now hauling off the yards, the leading teams being Wolverton and Knowlton, with McCarty bringing up the rear.

Manzer Howland and Gilbert Hathaway are tending landings. They are in hot water all the time, the teamsters being such hustlers.

Jethrow Grass of Waasie, is boss of the road-monkeys and he keeps the shovel brigade very busy making the roads good for the teams.

We have had plenty of snow lately. I fell about three feet. There is about seven feet here now.

We experienced a wild time Wednesday night about eleven o'clock, when the camp caught fire and for about ten minutes it was very doubtful whether it could be got out or not. The wind was blowing a gale and the flames ran along the peak of the roof, which was corked with straw. Some of the men got upon the roof and stripping off the splits were enabled to reach the fire, on which they piled snow. After half an hour of great excitement the fire was extinguished. The camp had been shovelled off the day before on account of the heavy body of snow on it to prevent it from breaking in but for this the camps would surely have been destroyed and the men turned out in a very cold night.

The boss had quite an experience yesterday with a caribou. He was going out the tote road a short distance from the camp when he saw a caribou charging towards him. The road was a shovelled one and the sides were quite high. He waved his hands and shouted at the animal, which turned and made back along the road till it met the tote coming in. It again turned as it neared the horses and made back at a furious gait toward Ed. who at this moment appeared in sight. But nothing could stop him now, and Ed. gave him a parting slap as he swept past like a flash.

This prevents our meeting most of you personally, and we therefore rely on your writing with us at the polls in casting this Government.
