Distinguished Sportsmen.

Ariadne, flagship of the North Atlantic squadron, and a subordinate officer from the same ship, have gone to the Tobique to enjoy a few week's salmon fishing in the pools belonging to Lord Strathcona. Arrangements for the trip were made by Mr. W. T. Whitehead, M. P. P., and he accompanied the visitors to the Tobique.

Light Hay Crop.

Hay is very light in most sections of the country and will scarcely average half an ordinary crop. A Kingsclear man, who cut twenty-five tons on his uplands last year, was only able to gather eleven tons this season. In some sections the showing made is even worse than that. A prominent and well informed Southampton farmer told The Herald that the crop in his neighborhood would not be sufficient to winter the live stock.

A Brooklyn Visitor.

Mr. W. J. T. Lynch of Brooklyn, N. Y., a veteran of the Spanish American war, who is spending his vacation in the lower provinces, was among the arrivals in the city on Saturday. He brought him a letter of introduction from our former townsman, Mr. A. G. Beckwith, C. E., to Mr. R. S. Barker, and was most hospitably entertained by the latter at "The Birches." A COOL TRICK.

Unknown Man Robbed Near the Star Line Wharf.

Last evening an unknown man had his pockets rifled and his boots stolen from his feet while sleeping off the effects of a debauch in a shed owned by Lemont & Sons, near the Star Line Wharf. The robbery was committed by a one-armed tramp, who has been going about the city for several days soliciting alms, and several of the deck-hands of the Victoria saw him commit the deed, but, strange to say, made no effort to stop him. He first went through the pockets of the drunken man and took care of what money and valuables he had, and afterwards removed the fellow's boots from his feet and exchanged them for his own, which were much the worse for wear. The thief then coolly walked away, leaving his victim lying upon the ground fast asleep. This morning the tramp did the city a good turn by boarding the Steamer Victoria and getting out. The robbery has not yet been reported to the police.

The place where the robbery occurred seems to be quite a resort for "boozers" and "men of rest," and a good many flasks of whiskey are emptied there in the run of a week, greatly to the annoyance of people living and working in the vicinity. The police are not over-worked these days and there is no reason why they should not pay an occasional visit to the place and assert their authority.

A REFUTATION.

Bath Correspondent Says Murderer Cammack is Protestant.

To the Editor of the Herald:

Sir.—In your issue of July 19th your correspondent from Bristol went to a great deal of trouble to give you a true statement of the Thomas Cammack and Doherty tragedy and declared that the cause was sectarianism.

Your correspondent also stated that the Dohertys were Protestants and Cammack was a Roman Catholic.

I do not know where he got his information, unless it originated in his own mind. I have known Thomas Cammack for twenty-five years and he was a Protestant all those years and was one all his life up to the day of the murder.

He married a Mrs. Boyd, wife of a man in Dorchester penitentiary for rape, about eight years ago and was married by a Baptist minister. His son married a sister of Mrs. Cammack and they were sisters to the murdered man.

I just want to place Cammack where he belongs, and I do not think it fair to brand the Catholics of New Brunswick that one of their number committed the foul deed.

You will please give space in your valuable journal for this letter, and refute the foul charges made by your correspondent from Bristol,

HIGHWAY ACT.

Unanimously Approved by New Denmark Farmers.

HON. MESSRS. LABILLOIS AND FARRIS HAD VERY CORDIAL RECEPTION.

Grand Falls, July 25.—One of the most successful meetings of the series being held by Hon. Messrs. LaBillois and Farris in the up river counties took place at the prosperous Danish settlement of New Denmark, nine miles from this town, Saturday evening.

There was a very large attendance of the farmers of the district, and Rev. Mr. Maimann, Anglican clergyman, made a very efficient chairman.

Besides the government members addresses were delivered by Messrs. Burgess and Tweeddale M. P.'s for the county, and all were well received.

One of the questions discussed was the desirability of securing for settlement 60,000 acres of land held in the vicinity by the New Brunswick Land Company. New Denmark is one of the most prosperous settlements in the province, and the wide awake farmers there gave the members a very hearty reception and listened most attentively to the addresses, afterwards giving unanimous approval to the new highway act. Fruit culture and wheat growing are two prosperous enterprises of the settlement. Dairying is very extensively and successfully carried on and excellent schools are well supported.

The ministers close their present series of meetings at Edmundston tomorrow evening.

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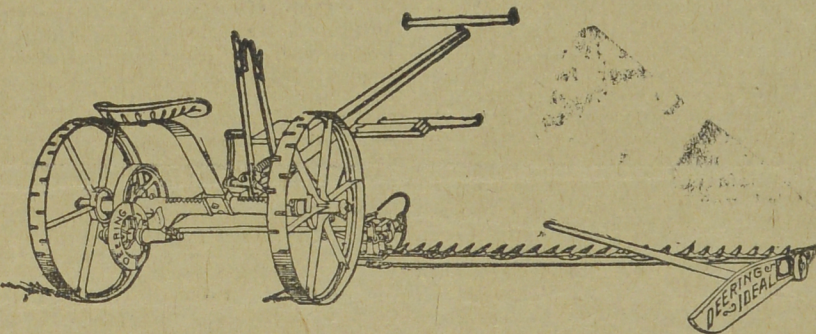
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
