CHURCH AND STATE IN UNISON.

Politicians and Priests Gather Around Corner Stone Laying

AT OTTAWA UNIVERSITY.

Roman Catholics Honored the King

AND PROTESTANTS HONORED THE CARDINAL.

Ottawa, May 25.—A coming together of big men in Church and State, of several races, of all Christian creeds, in mutual and tactful testimony to the essential value of the higher education—this struck the keynote of the ceremonial when the corner-stone of the new building of the University of Ottawa was laid yesterday at noon.

The King's representative, His Excellency the Governor General the Earl of Minto; His Excellency's constitutional advisor, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the premier of the Dominion, with several of his ministerial colleagues; Cardinal Gibbons the head of the Roman Catholic church in the United States; the Pope's representative in Canada, Mgr. Sbarretti, apostolic delegate; bishops and archbishops from Ontario and Quebec; representatives of Toronto, Queen's and Laval Universities; priests from almost every Roman Catholic diocese in Canada; the Minister of Education for Ontario; clerical adherents of the Anglican and Evangelical churches in Ottawa; representatives of the Catholic laity, both French and Irish, in Ottawa; all the students of the University of Ottawa; municipal dignitaries; Separate and Public school teachers—all these took part in the several ceremonies, and a perfect tact, following most masterly arrangement of detail, ruled the entire ceremony.

The King Came First.

The King came first throughout. It is assumed that this must have been the condition of his Excellency's participation, though there was no sign throughout the entire day, on the part of the church dignitaries of any lack of sympathy with the arrangement. The point is noted simply because of the fact that in the University ceremonies heretofore the Pope has had nominal priority to the King.

Irish Revolt Was Suppressed.

Another point was wiped out. There has been growing among certain of the Irish residents of Ottawa during the past few years an impression that the control of the University was being handed over to the French. The removal of Rev. Father Fallon, idolized of the parish of St. Joseph's, and of the Irish adherents of Ottawa College, lent a weight to the protest. On the eve of yesterday's ceremonial it took shape in a protest by a local Irish organization. The protest was answered by the presence yesterday of several of the more substantial Irishmen of Ottawa. Denis Murphy, M. P. P., for Ottawa; Hon. Frank Latchford, Chevalier John Henry and Rev. Father Fallon himself, who had accompanied Cardinal Gibbons to the Capital, showed by a characteristic activity in the entire ceremonial, how little they were in sympathy with the growing tendency to disrupt the hitherto impregnable ranks of the Irish of Ottawa.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier clinched the point at the luncheon which followed the laying of the corner stone. He said that the University would be English, if he had his way, but if that meant exclusion he would express an emphatic negative. There was coming a time when no man's education would be complete unless he could speak two languages, and these should be the two that had earned the greatest observance in the civilized world.

A Tripartite Ceremony.

It was King's weather in Ottawa—what we used to call Queen's weather—bright, but breezy, and the well-dressed throng which took part in the ceremonial seemed to enjoy every part of it. The ceremonial itself was, like Caesar's Gaul, divided in three parts. First, there was the solemn pontifical mass in St. Joseph's Church. The great church was emptied after a service lasting an hour and a half, and the participants crossed the street to a pavilion set above the corner-stone of the edifice, which is to rise from the ruins of the burned buildings. There the great men were seen together for the first time. The Apostolic Delegate occupied the raised platform on which the corner-stone abutted. The Cardinal sat on a couch at the foot of the rough deal steps. There he held his court. There came to salute him the Prime Minister, members of the Cabinet, prominent Anglican clergymen, each in his own fashion. The majority of the adherents of the Roman Catholic faith bent the knee and kissed the Cardinal's ring. Then came the King's deputy, the governor-general attended only by Captain Bell, and wearing the conventional morning garb. The governor-general, having paid his respects to the Cardinal, stood uncovered while the Apostolic Delegate officiated at the simple but impressive ecclesiastical ceremony of the laying of the stone.

The Cardinal's Personality.

The proverbial royal promititude was matched accurately with their proverbial

ecclesiastical exactness, and the stone was laid exactly at noon. Father Fallon had in the meantime introduced to Cardinal Gibbons, at the foot of the stair leading to the platform, all of the distinguished men who had sought introduction. And this brings us to the central figure. The Cardinal is in his 70th year. He will pass the year in July. In every manifestation of activity, physical and mental, he might pass for 50. A face, commonplace enough in features, is marked by so rare a play of good humor and good sense as is seldom seen. His ready smile is a benediction to itself. It seemed to need no assistance from the great finger ring to which eminent Canadians in genuflection had touched their lips under the white glare of the Victoria day sun. He mounted the platform and spoke for a few moments in simple imitation of his master. He had at his command an English at once ornate and direct. He quoted scripture with a freedom not often found among smaller men in his own church, and threw an anchor to windward in an eloquent reference to the domestic virtues of Queen Victoria, whose birthday the British Empire celebrated yesterday.

A Luncheon in the Rink.

The third part of the celebration was a luncheon in the Rideau Rink. Archbishop Duhamel, Chancellor of the University, presided. He had on his right the Governor-General, on whose right sat the Apostolic Delegate. On the chairman's left sat Cardinal Gibbons, and then Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The Governor-General entered after the other guests had been seated, a band playing "God Save the King," while he mounted the dais. Archbishop Duhamel, in an opening speech, proclaimed the unity of Church and State in the advancement of

education and Christianity. The Governor-General proposed the King without comment, and Cardinal Gibbons proposed the Holy Father in the same manner. Mgr. Sbarretti, in responding to the latter toast read a message from the Pope.

The Premier, who had spent the afternoon chatting with Cardinal Gibbons, was at his best in appearance and elocutionary form.

Last night Cardinal Gibbons was dined by the Speaker of the House of Commons who brought to meet him not only the visiting prelates of the Roman Catholic Church, but the Anglican Bishop of Ottawa, and representatives of the clergy of the Methodist, Presbyterian, Congregational and Baptist Churches in Ottawa.

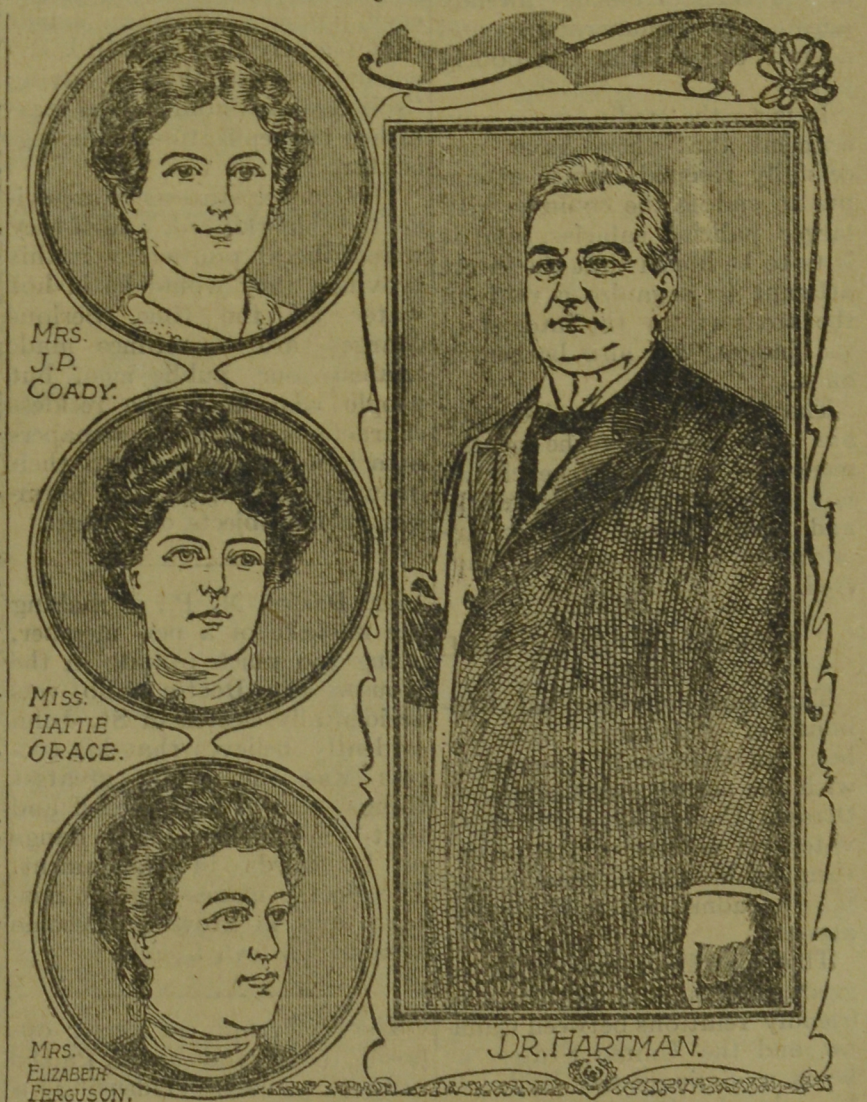
