TREES ALONG HIGHWAYS.

Their Presence Adds to Commercial Value of Property.

To the Editor of The Herald:

Sir—The value of trees or the commercial value actually added to property may often be much greater from ornamental trees than any common agricultural crops ever yield in total through a series of years.

With all our shortcomings in regard to planting and care of trees, there are in the city trees which we would not part with for \$200 each.

It is the wise man, the thoughtful man, the tractful man, the man of large views and of clear perception to whom we must look for successful tree planting.

Last year we lost many for the want of knowledge and proper care. As we grow older as a people, as we gain in culture,

as we come more highly to value the beautiful and as we recognize more fully that there are possibilities of enjoyment in life higher in kind than those of eating and drinking or of ostentatious exhibition of wealth, we shall plant more trees for ornament, and especially for the decoration and better utilization of public grounds and thoroughfares, and we shall in some way find methods by which they can be much better cared for.

This has already come to pass in older countries. In Germany you see it on every hand; in France and England the traveller is struck with this.

In our own country some advancement has been made. Wherever societies have been formed they have rendered excellent service in regard to tree planting and tree management upon the streets. But very much remains to be done even where the most has been done, and the possibilities are very considerable at the cost of in considerable effort and expense.

ACCIDENTALLY DROWNED.

Fate of Joseph Wise Former Canterbury Man Reported Murdered.

A few days ago the Herald published from the Minneapolis Journal an account of the mysterious disappearance of Joseph Wise: a former resident of Canterbury, supposed to have been murdered. It seems however, that he was accidentally drowned and his body has been recovered.

The following is from the Minneapolis Journal of Friday last:

The body of Joseph Wise was discovered in the river last evening at 6 o'clock, floating near the shore, about two blocks from the Washington avenue bridge, over the Bohemian flats by some boys, who poled it out and notified the coroner.

Dr. Williams visited the place and had it removed to the morgue.

The corpse was badly bloated, but was identified by Dr. Williams from papers found in the clothes. These consisted of a letter and an insurance receipt.

A watch was also found on the body, which had stopped at ten minutes after 4. This would seem to confirm the theory that he fell off the Soo railroad bridge, in an attempt to follow his woman companion of the evening, as the last seen of him was at 4 a. m.

The coroner's inquest will not be held until this morning, but the cursory examination which Dr. Williams gave the body last evening revealed no marks of violence and a verdict of accidental drowning will probably be returned.

TOTAL WRECKS.

Coast of Newfoundland Graveyard for Shipping.

ALLAN LINE STEAMSHIP HIBERNIAN LOST IN FOG.

Schooner and Bark Also Victims—All the Crews Safe.

St. John's Nfld., May 18.—The British bark, Helen Isabel laden with molasses from Barbadoes for St. John's, was wrecked off Mistaken Point yesterday in a dense fog.

The vessel will be total loss. Crew escaped.

Schooner Pansy, salt laden, is also ashore off Point Veddle same vicinity. She will be a total loss. All on board were saved.

Steamship Lost.

St. John's Nfld., May 17.—The Allan Line steamer Hibernian which sailed from Montreal May 14, and Quebec, May 15, for London, with cattle and a general cargo, and with seven passengers, went ashore at midnight last night during a dense fog at Stormy Point, a shoal near Cod Roy, thirty miles north of Cape Race at the entrance of the gulf of St. Lawrence.

The vessel is listing and filling fast, and is it feared that she will become a total wreck.

The crew and passengers are safe.
