MISSIONARY HOME

After Seven Years in Chinese and Korean Fields.

MISS McCULLY OF TRURO TELLS HER EXPERIENCE.

Incidents of the War.

Truro Daily News.--It was announced in the News on Monday that Miss Louise Hoard McCully had returned to this, her native town, after an absence of seven years in the mission fields of Central China and Korea. During the Boxer trouble, it was deemed wise to have the missionaries leave the celestial empire and Miss McCully, along with several other workers, went to Japan in 1900 for a few months. Just before this she was accepted by the Canadian Presbyterian Mission Board to join the forces in Korea. She went to the seaport town of Wonsan on the East coast, that Fall and has labored there until last August, when it was arranged that she should have a furlough.

It was not on account of the war, that has made Korea the battleground, that Miss McCully came home; all the rest of the staff of the Canadian Presbyterian Mission, are still in that far off land, and have experienced no special danger or harm, though frequently threatened. Taking her three years of service in China into consideration, Miss McCully had been longer in the East than any of the other missionaries at Wonsan, so that she came first in line for a vacation.

Leaving that city in August 29th, she came overland to Seoul, a distance of 180 miles. The journey, partly over a rugged, mountainous country, was made by sedan chair, and required six days.

"That was good time for a Korean cross-country trip," said Miss McCully, "and from Seoul I went by rail to Chemulpo, the sea port of that capital, where there is a steamboat service to Japan. It was an American ship that took me to Kobe where the splendid ocean-going liners of the Canadian Pacific railway Company touch on the voyage across the Pacific."

When asked about the conditions now prevailing in Korea as caused by the war, Miss McCully said:

"The general opinion is that Japan's marvellous success must end in complete victory. A number of war correspondents came over with me in the Empress of Japan, among them Richard Harding Davis, John Fox, Jr., Frederick Palmer and E. F. Knight. The last named is an Englishman, who, was the only journalist fortunate enough to get to the front with the Japanese army, where he witnessed the battle of Liao Yang and he was loud in his praises of Japanese prowess, and very confident of their ultimate success."

"As we missionaries, who are British subjects were asked to be neutral and in fact signed a paper to that effect, I was not free to express an opinion regarding either Russia or Japan while in Korea."

"We do not think it desirable that either nation should gain control there."

"If Russia should triumph there might be no tolerance of Protestant mission work, while the Japanese have hitherto refrained from interfering with foreigners, who have gone there to teach Christian doctrine. So, if Japan should triumph and adhere to her present treaty with Korea to maintain the latter's independence, it is not likely that mission work would be disturbed."

"So far the chief effect of the war has been in the north, where the natives are much agitated. After the battle of the Yalu river, we, on the east coast, had our first excitement. Four times the Russians approached Wonsan--twice over land, and twice by warships."

The most formidable attack was made on June 30th by seven torpedo boat destroyers, that threw some three or four hundred shells into the town and harbor, burning two Japanese vessels. They must be bad marksmen, for the only life lost in the Japanese quarter was that of a solitary chicken. As the Russians have practically occupied the North Eastern part of the country, mission work there has been greatly impeded among the frightened natives. At Song Chin, near Vladivostok, the Japanese settlement was wiped out by fire, but our missionaries, Rev. Robert Grierson of Halifax, and Rev. A. F. Robb, of St. John, were unmolested. Dr. Grierson came to Wonsan, intending soon to return, but all means of travel and communication were cut off by Russian troops. Mr. Robb bravely stayed on alone through the summer, and was spared from harm. I had the pleasure of seeing him in Wonsan just before I left.

The entire staff of the Canadian Mission, is now in that city awaiting further developments."

"Our special field is in the provinces of North Ham Kyung, South Ham Kyung, and Kang Won, which have a population of over a million. There are eleven Presbyterian workers located at our three stations,--Wonsan, Ham Heung and Song Chin, with twenty-six churches scattered among the out-stations. We make extensive itinerations through these three provinces, and my own trips to the south and south west, require three weeks, and cover one hundred miles each."

"We are delightfully situated at Wonsan, which is perhaps the most beautiful place in that part of the world, and has a magnificent harbor--rivaling even that of Nagasaki in Japan."

"The Koreans are an amiable race, much more so than their neighbors in the two larger countries. Their mild temperament has caused them to be much oppressed, but they are not lacking in intelligence, and compare favorably with either Chinese or Japanese in this respect. They are more receptive of Christian truth than the people among whom I formerly labored in Central China. For all these reasons, Korea is considered the most promising of all Asiatic mission fields, and the results already accomplished in the face of two wars, have been most encouraging."

"It is very pleasant to be home among old friends," said Miss McCully at the conclusion of this interview so kindly given our reporter, "but I am more eager than ever to return to Korea, the land of the morning calm," as it is called in their language."

READY FOR FIGHT.

P. E. Island Liberals Girding on Their Arms

TO CARRY PETERS GOVERNMENT TO VICTORY.

Charlottetown, Nov. 11.--The announcement of the provincial elections for December 7th, finds the Liberals throughout the province united, enthusiastic and harmonious. The triumphant return of Liberals in Canada has given a great stimulus to the party who are determined to retrieve the serious blunder made on Nov. 3rd, when a majority of Conservatives were returned for the province. The opposition are boastfully confident of defeating the government, but they are doomed to deep disappointment.

One of the greatest handicaps the province has to struggle against is lack of revenue; and the policy of the Liberals is to press the claims against the Dominion government. There is a large amount due the province as its share of the Fishery Award and the people realize that the chances of obtaining this materially increases by electing the government in line with the government at Ottawa.

The Liberal administration has been marked by efficient and economical conduct of the public service, taxation has been adjusted to bear evenly on all classes of the people, and much beneficial legislation has been enacted. One of the important measures of the present government has been the securing for all time to come an addition of thirty thousand dollars to the annual subsidy.

Liberals have already nominated twenty-four out of thirty candidates and the Conservatives twenty-one. The former have exceptionally strong and popular candidates, including a number of new men who have decided to join the fighting to carry Premier Peters' measures heartily assurance of support all over the Island.

Opposition leader Mathieson will be in great danger of losing his seat in Georgetown district, where the former large Conservative majority was reduced almost to vanishing point during the recent Federal election. The town of Georgetown, which last election gave the Tories sixty-eight majority, on Nov. 3rd gave Mr. Hughes, Liberal, a majority of five. In Charlottetown the Liberals have again nominated Prose and Dr. Warburton who are sure of re-election.

There he met Mrs. Lulu Young Brons-wiler, a divorced young woman of twenty-two. He wrote wives Nos. one and two that he was detained in Marion on business, and married Mrs. Brons-wiler after an elopement.

Logansport, Ind., was his next stop, where he was married to a fourth, wives Nos. two and three arrived. No. two had gone to Marion to look up Edward, and No. three was turned out of her mother's home. She went to Logansport and had Lane arrested, charged with bigamy. He told his own story, saying:

Settling Up Quebec.

Montreal, Nov. 11.--According to L. E. Caruel, secretary of the Quebec Colonization Society, there has been considerable settlement in the northern and north-eastern portions of this province since January last. "During the season," Mr. Caruel said today, "there has been an increase of over 150 per cent, in the number of colonists that have been placed in lands in the district north of Montreal, the Metanidia and the Lake St. John, districts. More than two thousand settlers have arrived since the beginning of the year. In addition to those placed in this part of the country quite a number of French-Canadians went. Most of them settled in the French parishes of Manicoba."
