

BOLD HIGHWAYMAN.**Knocked a Cashier Down
and Attempted Robbery****BUT PARTY ASSAILED HELD ON TO
HIS SATCHEL****And the Big Sum of Money - It
Contained.**

Hamilton, Nov. 12.—A daring attempt was made to hold up Walter Champ, cashier at the Hamilton Bridge works, shortly before six o'clock last night.

Champ was returning to the office after paying off the men in the main building, when a man approached him, and hit him a blow over the eye and struck him over the head with a sling shot, knocking him down.

Champ was dazed by the two blows, but did not become unconscious, and held on to the satchel containing a considerable sum of money which he was carrying. He cried for help, and as another man came to the rescue his assailant ran away.

It is said that the satchel contained \$2,500 or \$3,000.

DARING BURGLARY.**Robbers Broke Into Private Bank
and Blew Up the Safe.**

Chatham, Ont., Nov. 12.—The village of Florence, about ten miles from here, was the scene of a daring burglary, early yesterday, when marauders broke into the private bank of Isaac Unsworth, at that place, blew the large safe to atoms with nitroglycerine, and succeeded in obtaining a small amount of money.

The burglars also destroyed some very valuable papers that Mr. Unsworth kept in his safe, and left no clue.

THE WAR SITUATION.**No Heavy Fighting, but Intermit-

VICTIMS OF ASPHYXIATION.**One Canadian Dead at Chicago,
and Another Likely to Die.**

Montreal, Nov. 12.—Telegrams re-

ceived here tell of the death of one Canadian and the probable death of a second, through asphyxiation in Chicago.

The dead man is Adam Spivin of Brandon, Man., and his companion is Angus Taylor of Pembroke, Ont. Taylor was taken to the hospital unconscious.

The men left the gas half turned on in their room.

BANK'S AMALGAMATION.**An Old Story Revamped and Sent on its
Mission.**

Montreal, Nov. 12.—It is understood that an important bank amalgamation scheme is nearing completion. A charter has been secured for the Alliance Bank of Canada, with a capital of \$5,000,000. This bank is expected to absorb the Metropolitan Bank of Toronto, the People's Bank of Halifax, the People's Bank of New Brunswick, and the Prince Edward Island Bank. The bank from the start would have an important connection in Ontario, this part of Quebec, and the Maritime Provinces.

The late John F. Stairs, president of the Nova Scotia Steel Company and the People's Bank of Halifax, was the prime mover in the amalgamation project, and since his death the interests of the Metropolitan Bank have been perfecting the project.

THE PURCHASABLE PRESS.**Wonder if This Fits Anywhere in New
Brunswick?**

Montreal Witness: The press have invaded news, a perdom, and a newspaper is now regarded by the capitalists as a useless, opinionless thing, like a flour mill, or a steel works, and the only question that occurs to them is, "Will it pay to acquire and run it; and how much can we make out of the common stock?" Newspapers acquired in such a fashion and run on such lines must surely soon lose the respect of the self-respecting public. They will always be a drag on public opinion rather than a motive force, and will only be respectable so far as it pays them to be. Their currency will always be a drag upon honorable journalism, and we may yet see more monuments of honest thought topple before the rising tide of mud and water. Doubtless it will all right itself in the end, but the outlook just at the moment is not very encouraging for independent journalism.

Brave Bank Clerk.

Ottawa, Nov. 12.—George E. Clark, of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, and son of J. D. Clark, private secretary to the minister of justice, by his heroic conduct yesterday afternoon, saved a youth from drowning in the Rideau canal. There were two or three boys skating on rather thin ice, and one of them disappeared in the water. Clark was near at hand and jumped in the canal with his overcoat on. It took him some time getting the lad ashore, and Clark is suffering from a severe chill.

Newspaper Burned Out.

Charlottetown, Nov. 12.—Fire shortly before midnight badly gutted the Weekly Watchman building and Dillon's barber shop, on Lower Queen street. There was no insurance, and the fire is a big loss to Peter McCourt, editor of the Watchman, who is the Conservative candidate against Commissioner of Public Works Commiskey in the coming local elections.

A Short Married Life.

Halifax, Nov. 12. The death occurred here last night, of Mrs. Parsons, wife of George H. Parsons, barrister. Deceased was a daughter of James McQuinn, of this city, a former well known newspaper man, and was twenty-nine years of age. She was married three months ago, at Okotokine, Calgary.

Perhaps the greatest welcome that has ever been given to any representative was accorded to Hon. W. S. Fielding on his arrival here on Wednesday. He was met by a numerous train of carriages and escorted through the town. In the evening there was a general informal reception held in the opera house, and upwards of six hundred friends from over the entire county were there to congratulate the Minister upon his unprecedented victory of Nov. 3rd. 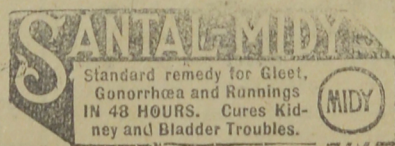
