

A FINE BOAT.

The New River Steamer Pokanoket on Her Trial Trip.

VICTORIA AND CHAMPLAIN ALSO IN PORT.

Brought a Large Quantity of Freight to the City.

The steamer Pokanoket, which has been purchased recently in Philadelphia by the Star Line Company, arrived at Indiantown wharf, St. John, yesterday. Capt. Wasson was in charge.

The Pokanoket promises to be one of the speediest boats on the river. She has ample freight room and can accommodate 750 passengers. During the winter she will undergo some repairs and some alteration will be made in her.

The Pokanoket was built at Brooklyn, N. Y., in 1894. She is about 151 feet in length, 29 feet in breadth and has a registered tonnage of 254 tons, and gross tonnage of 319 tons. She will go on the route between St. John and Fredericton next spring.

THE LAST TRIP.

Three Star Line Steamers Arrive --- The Pokanoket as an Ice Breaker.

The steamers Pokanoket and Champlain of the Star Line arrived in port at 1.15 o'clock this afternoon. They left St. John at six o'clock, and came right through without a stop. They encountered a large quantity of ice between Gagetown and this city, but the Pokanoket, which had the lead, had not the slightest difficulty in breaking a channel.

The Champlain was loaded with freight to her fullest capacity, but the Pokanoket came light for the purpose of breaking the ice. The Pokanoket was only recently purchased by the Company, and never having been registered or inspected in Canada. Manager Orchard had to obtain permission from Ottawa before he could run her up the river. Permission was granted with the undertaking that she carry neither passengers nor freight. Manager Orchard was the only person on board besides the crew, and in conversation with The Herald he expressed himself as being well satisfied with the showing made by the new boat on her trial trip. He says that she will be given a thorough overhauling during the coming winter, and will be put on the St. John-Fredericton route with the Victoria next spring. Asked if the company would undertake to find a new name for her, he replied that the question had not yet been considered.

The Pokanoket, which is a twin screw steamer of 151 feet in length, was purchased in Camden, N. J. and formerly plied on the Delaware river. She is a pretty slick looking craft, and people who inspected her this afternoon, seemed to be of the opinion that she would easily fill the place vacated by the David Weston.

The steamer Victoria arrived from St. John at three o'clock this afternoon, with a large cargo of freight, which was immediately discharged. Only a few passengers were on board, the trip having been made solely for the purpose of delivering the freight that had accumulated in the company's hands.

All three steamers returned to St. John this afternoon, and will be taken off the route for the winter.

MANUAL TRAINING.

Course to be Provided for Students at the Normal School.

A special course of preparation for manual training teachers is announced to commence on Jan. 9th, 1905, and the director begs to call the attention of teachers to the desirability of taking advantage of it.

A demand exists for male teachers of woodwork in manual training departments; also for teachers of either sex, who are able to give instruction in country schools having an equipment for manual training on a small scale.

The liberal grants now being offered to teachers of manual training should lead some of our enterprising teachers to take

up this branch of school work which is rapidly becoming such an important part of our educational system.

In addition to this special course in woodwork, etc., short courses in paper-folding, colour work, cardboard work, etc., may be taken at any time.

Information as to any of the courses may be obtained from the director of manual training, Mr. T. B. Kidner, Fredericton, to whom early application should be made.

WON'T HAVE PEACE.

Russian Officer Says Japan Must Fight it Out.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 11---Referring to Lord Lansdowne's arbitration suggestion a prominent official of the foreign office expressed the opinion to the Associated Press that such an offer even coming from Japan could not possibly be accepted.

"Such a controversy," he said "cannot be arbitrated. The idea is not worth considering. We believed the Japanese have reached the turn of the tide and it must go. The only possibility of peace now in my opinion would be on the basis of a proposition submitted by Russia to Japan offering to accept less than she demanded before hostilities were opened. As it is inconceivable that Japan at this juncture is prepared to offer such terms, I see no chance of ending the war."

Four Lives Lost.

New York, Nov. 12---Four persons lost their lives Wednesday night off Barnegat light, in a collision between the United States refrigerated ship Colgoa and the lumber schooner Wilson & Hunting, of Norfolk (Va.), according to the story brought here today by four of the survivors of the schooner, which was thrown on its beam ends by the steamship, and is now a derelict.

The victims of the collision were Captain Robert Walton, his wife and two seamen. Those saved were the mate, whose name is Patterson; the cook and two seamen. The schooner is now believed to be drifting about in the neighborhood of Barnegat, nearly cut in two.
