

ALL DAY FIGHT.

Russians and Japs Put
Up Stiff Battle
at Anjou,BUT FORMER FLED ON AP-
PROACH OF JAPANESE
REINFORCEMENTS.Tokio Denies That Railway
is Open to Port Arthur.RUSSIANS BLEW UP THEIR OWN
DOCKS AT DALNY.But Deny Destroying Their Ships at
Port Arthur.

St. Petersburg, May 12.—Viceroy Alexieff has telegraphed to the Czar announcing that the Russians have blown up the docks and piers at Port Dalny, Liao Tung peninsula, presumably to render more difficult a Japanese landing at that point.

Report Denied.

St. Petersburg, May 12.—Major General Pfing, telegraphing from Mukden under today's date, describes the reports that New Chwang has been evacuated, and that the troops guarding the railroad are to be withdrawn and to be replaced by Chinese, as being devoid of foundation.

Alexieff Contradicted.

Tokio, May 12.—Official inquiry shows that Viceroy Alexieff's report that railway communication with Port Arthur has been restored since Monday, is untrue.

Shan Hai Kwan, May 12.—Firing is reported to have been heard today south of New Chwang.

Clearing the Harbor.

London, May 12.—The correspondent of the Daily Express at St. Petersburg says: "I learn from official sources that so far from blowing up their warships, which would be done only at very last extreme, the garrison at Port Arthur is engaged in clearing the entrance of the harbor, which was more or less completely blocked by stone laden ships sent in by the Japanese for that purpose."

Fight at Anjou.

Tokio, [May 12.—Later] details of the Russian attack on Anjou, Tuesday, state that the fighting lasted all day.

Japanese reinforcements arrived from Ping Yang at 1 o'clock in the afternoon and the Russians retreated Wednesday morning at the approach of further Japanese reinforcements.

The Japanese are pursuing the Russians in the direction of Kai Chong.

The Japanese casualties were four killed and six wounded.

The Russian casualties were about fifty.

Japanese Army Advancing.

St. Petersburg, May 12.—Lieut. General Sakharoff sent a despatch to the general staff yesterday communicating a report of Lieut. General Zassalitch, dated May 10, as follows:

"Troops which appeared to be a division of the Japanese Guard have been advancing for the last two days from Feng Wang Cheng westerly in the direction of Hai Cheng.

"From reports received from the River Dazaw it may be concluded that the Japanese army is concentrated in three groups, the two southern groups being on the lower section of the River Tayang at Honbuhanya, on the left bank of the river at Dayan and at Donamyo in the same locality, and the northern group opposite Habalina, on the road from FeFeng Wang Cheng to Salidza, 14 to 16 miles from Feng Wang Cheng.

Shan Hai Kwan, May 12.—The Russian troops are lingering in the vicinity of

Newchwang, and some of them are returning to the city. The Russian artillery is ready for instant transportation. Hai Cheng is being reinforced with troops from Liao Yang.

It is reported here that the Japanese are creeping closely to Port Arthur. It is believed that the first Japanese army corps is still at Feng Wang Cheng.

Getting in Rear of the Japs.

Seoul, Korea, May 10, 2 30 p.m., (delayed in transmission). The sudden attack on the Japanese garrison at Anju by 200 Russians confirms previous reports of the presence of Russian scouting parties behind the Japanese lines. The small Japanese garrison at Anju indicate that the blow was not expected. The fighting at Anju commenced early this morning. The Japanese garrison has sent a telegram to nearby posts on the Wija road for reinforcements.

Great Events Pending.

St. Petersburg, May 12.—Impending events of great importance to the military situation in Manchuria are foreshadowed in the official despatches given out late last night by the war commissioner.

On May 8 the Japanese forces cautiously moved from Fang Wang Cheng towards Hai Cheng, which is 32 miles east by north of Newchwang.

The entire Liao Tung peninsula in fact, save Port Arthur and perhaps Kaiping, would be commanded by them.

The satisfaction felt at the re-establishment of communication with Port Arthur is increased by the knowledge that a trainload of ammunition has been safely delivered to the fortress. This was done in the presence of the enemy's army which landed at Pitsewo and which is apparently on the eve of being reinforced by another division on board thirty transports lying off Port Adams.

The Associated Press has received the following assurance from a member of the general staff:

"There are ample supplies of munitions of war at Port Arthur, but naturally General Kuropatkin desired to send as much as possible to the fortress. "During the expected siege great quantities of shells and explosives will be fired, and we cannot afford to permit the reproach of the defenders that they could not hold Port Arthur because of a lack of powder and shell. But I assure you there are enough supplies there for one year."

Train Reaches Port Arthur.

St. Petersburg, May 11.—General Kuropatkin telegraphed to the emperor that a train loaded with war material from Liao Yang has arrived at Port Arthur.

The text of General Kuropatkin's despatch is as follows:

"Reconnaissance between Salitzai-pudza and Feng Wang Cheng failed to discover Japanese troops.

"A Japanese column of considerable strength advanced from Feng Wang Cheng May 8 in the direction of Hai Haicheng.

"Palau-Cheng station is occupied by our frontier guards and the damage to the railway by the Japanese as far as Sunchilipa has been repaired. All the work was carried out under the supervision of Lieut. Col. Spiridonoff of the fourth railway battalion. This gallant officer undertook to get through to Port Arthur a train full of ammunition which had arrived at Liao Yang after the landing of the Japanese at Pitsewo. Every preparation was made to blow up the train in case of necessity in order to prevent its falling into the hands of the Japanese.

SEALING STEAMER.

Engaged by Government to Garry Supplies to Explorers in the Far North.

St. John's Nfld., Mar. 12.—The Canadian government has chartered the sealing steamer Erik to proceed to Hudson Bay in July next with supplies for the sealer Neptune, now with the Canadian expedition, sent for the purpose of enforcing Canadian laws against American whalers.

The Erik will also convey stores to the north for the steamer Gauss, in which ship Captain Bernier will proceed to the north and annex a number of Arctic Islands for the British Crown, and will attempt to reach the North Pole.
