## LIBERAL CONVENTION.

The Liberals of York are invited to meet in convention at the Y. M. C. A. hall, York street, Fredericton, at 2 p. m., Saturday next, Oct. 8, to nominate a candidate for the House of Commons.

All Liberals will be welcomed as well as others who are interested in securing the return of a government supporter from this constituency in the approaching contest.

## BAD JUDGMENT.

The Tories have opened their campaign in York with an attack on the government for proposing the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, and have alienated many of their friends who see for this county increased prosperity as the result of the new line. Dr. McLeod, who pretends to be a Tory leader, denounces the survey now in progress in this county as a fake survey, and it was echoed by a smaller voice that followed the doctor's gymnastics.

The construction of the transcontinental railway from ocean to ocean is pledged by the government and by parliament. A large section of it will traverse New Brunswick and sixty miles of it will be in York county.

Dr. McLeod is so familiar with fakes, fake prohibition commission, fake purity campaigns, etc., that he instinctively applies the term to the railway survey, the result of which is to prove of such benefit to York Co. The electors of York along the river St. John however will not be deceived by Dr. McLeod's denunciation. The government is earnest in the matter, and in spite of the doctor's prophecies the time is near when the long neglected river parishes of York will hear the whistle of the engine and enjoy railway connection with the outside world by means of a great transcontinental railway, 3,600 miles long, stretching from Port Simpson on the Pacific coast to St. John and Halifax.

The Tories denounced the government's intention to acquire the Canada Eastern Railway as a fake down to the very moment the road was transferred to the Intercolonial, and now that their prophecies in this respect have proved false, they are turning their attention to the Grand Trunk Pacific. The people, however, are not to be deceived by such tactics, and will turn down on Nov. 3 the men who are placing themselves in opposition to the construction of the transcontinental railway.

## VERY DISCOURAGING.

A glance at the platform during last night's Tory meeting at the Opera house disclosed in eloquent terms the condition to which the Tory party in this constituency has fallen in recent years, and a great many members of the party lay the blame, for the disorganization and bedevilment of the Tory forces to the advent of a gentleman who has stepped down from a sacred office to mix and mingle in political intrigue and strife for ends that are regarded as purely personal.

The opening shots of the Tory campaign in this county were to have been fired with considerable distinction. A couple of heavy guns from the upper provinces were billed to speak, but before the time arrived they were compelled to hurry home to save their own seats in parliament, and their substitutes made a sorry exhibition.

Dr. McLeod, as usual, mounted the

high moral pedestal and preached purity, while he knows that the history of the party with which he is connected is one long stretch of political debauchery and scandal. Mr. Crockett, who is trying to crowd the Doctor out of the leadership in York, attempted to discuss the railway question and the tariff, and got inextricably mixed, and Mr. Macinerney orated about the great Tory leaders of the past, whom he opposed with all his might when they were on the stage of action. The enthusiasm was very limited, coming chiefly from the platform, and the gathering was about as dreary as could be well conceived. Even Mr. Pinder seemed to be ashamed of the showing, occupying a seat in the back of the house.

If the meeting was intended to influence public opinion in this city, it was a most dismal and disappointing failure.

How refreshing it must have been to Tories at the Opera House last night to hear Tory speakers quoting with approval the sayings of Mr. Blair and Mr. Tarte. In the last contest these gentlemen were slandered from one end of the county to the other by the Tories, and in this city Mr. Tarte was burned in effigy.

## CAMPAIGN NOTES.

When the farmers are prosperous it is a poor time to ask them to vote for a change of government.

The Tories of York are not talking of a purity campaign this time. Where will they get the money?

Hon. A. S. White opened his campaign in Albert Saturday evening, and was given a very hearty reception. Ex-Governor McClellan presided.

There are indications that the Liberal candidates in St. John will be Hon. H. A. McKeown for the city and county and Richard O'Brien for the city.

There is beautiful harmony in the Tory party in this city. If you don't believe it, ask Mr. H. F. McLeod or Mr. A. R. Shipp or Mr. Ossie Crockett. How these brethren love each other!

Mr. Foster is up against hard trouble in North Ontario. The Liberals will put up the popular Mayor Urquhart, who is expected to wipe the earth with the ex-apostle of prohibition.

Mr. Macinerney says the Conservatives in parliament did not oppose government acquisition of the Canada Eastern Railway. Didn't they? What about Mr. Haggart's bitter and vindictive speech on the question?

In introducing Hon. H. R. Emmerson to the Liberal meeting at Amherst, Monday evening, the chairman, Hon. W. T. Pipes said the minister of railways was loved by the Cumberland people of all classes and creeds.

Mr. Macinerney, who was brought from St. John to instruct the people of York how to vote, has run nine elections in his time and was beaten six times out of the nine. He has been Liberal, Independent and Tory in his short political career.

The Sun says the Tory party in York is no weaker now than it was in the last general election when the Liberal majority was 76, but it forgets that there has been a bye-election since. In 1901 Mr. Gibson beat Mr. McLeod by a majority of 824.

Mr. Peter Ryan, registrar of East Toronto, an old Liberal war horse, and a strong and popular man, has thrown up his position and will oppose Mr. E. F. Clarke, the Tory candidate in South Toronto. That is what took Mr. Clarke home in such a hurry.

Mr. Macinerney says that the most ardent Liberals concede Manitoba, the northwest and British Columbia to the Opposition. What a whopper! We venture the assertion that there is not a well informed Liberal in Canada who does not anticipate a government majority in the west.

## SCHEDULE ACCEPTED.

A delegation had been waiting on Mechanical Superintendent Joughins the past few days arranging minor details. The schedule reference to wages was all accepted with some modifications in other particulars. The men speak highly of the treatment accorded them by the officials with whom the schedule was discussed.

## MADE GOOD HAUL.

Burglars Stole \$1800 From Lawyer's Safe.

Terrebonne, Que., Oct. 6.—Burglars entered the premises of the provincial bank here early this morning. The bank occupies part of Notary Mathieu's building, the bank vault being on one side of the room and Mathieu's safe on the other.

The robbers chose the latter safe and secured \$1,800 in cash and negotiable checks. The bank claims to have lost nothing. Payment of checks stolen has been stopped.

## LEPROUS CHINAMAN

Alarming Discovery by Vancouver Police.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 6.—A leper was picked up by the police yesterday on the principal business street here. His eyes looked much inflamed and he was noticed to limp badly. He was taken to the police station and examined, when it was found that several toes on one foot had dropped off.

This makes the second Chinaman afflicted with leprosy picked up here in the past two weeks.

## LAURIER'S RECEPTION.

Premier Opened Quebec Campaign in a Blaze of Glory.

Quebec, Oct. 6.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier spoke to a splendid audience at Jacques Cartier hall last night, and was given a very enthusiastic reception. Hundreds of people were unable to gain admittance and the cheering was almost continuous.

The Premier was in fine form and confidently predicted a rattling victory for the government at the polls.

## BOTH ARMIES QUIET

Mukden, Oct. 6.—The main forces of both armies remain quiet, but the scouts are active.

On Tuesday a Cossack detachment had a slight but sharp brush with some Japanese near the Yentai mines. The Japanese lost four men killed and had two captured; then they fled.

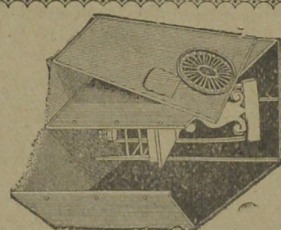
