Association Has Advanced the Scales for Minimum Salaries.

To the editor of The Herald:

Sir, — I wish to call the attention of your readers, and especially of the teachers, to the new schedule issued by the New Brunswick Teachers' Association.

The executive committee of that body has deemed it advisable to advance the minimum salaries to be accepted from the districts to the following figures:

Per annum.	
For Males—Gr. School, Superior and First Class, not less than	\$300 00
Second Class, not less than	240 00
Third Class, not less than	170 00
For Females—Prim. of Superior Schools, not less than	\$300 00
First Class and higher, other than Principals of Gram. and Snp. Schools, not less than	175 00
Second Class, not less than	165 00
Third Class, not less than	130 00

COLONIES AND THE NAVY.

Dr. Parkin Among Speakers Who Discussed the Question at London.

London, Dec. 21.—Last evening the Navy League assembled at the Whitehall rooms, under the auspices of the Colonial Institute, to listen to a paper on the "Empire and the Navy," by Mr. Wyatt, whose speeches in Canada on behalf of the Navy League will be remembered.

After the excellent presentation of the attitude of colonies, concerning the question of contributions for naval defence, by Mr. Wyatt, several speakers followed, among them the Hon. Mr. Brassey and Dr. Parkin, who has lost none of his old-time vigor on the platform.

Dr. Parkin argued that the attitude of Canada was understandable, regarding the question of contributions towards the maintenance of the British navy, and gave it as his opinion that the changed relations between England and France, which has resulted in the much banded "entente," would in a great measure affect the attitude of the French-Canadian population in this matter, that as it was no longer a question of Great Britain's navy gaining added strength from Colonial Exchequers to make it a formidable antagonist of old France, a mutual alliance would mean mutual defence. Mr. Parkin scored a good point when he directed his hearers' attention to the fact that the enormous strain put upon Canada's purse in the development of her Western wheat lands meant that Eastern Canada was continually providing the civilizing elements for communities which were formed by emigrants from the old land.

Mr. Brassey contended that Sir Wilfrid Laurier's answer to Mr. Chamberlain's desire, at the last Colonial Conference, that the colonies should contribute to Imperial defence, was unassailable. "No taxation without representation," and Mr. Brassey contended that some form of Imperial Council which had control of a government expenditure was the very crux of the question of Imperial defence. He advocated a form of government similar to that in Canada—local legislature and a federal parliament. It would be rather interesting to see if Russia and Great Britain were content to model their constitution on that of Canada, but this proposition is seriously entertained in the minds of many thoughtful men of the present day.

CANADIAN BONDS BURNED.

New York, Dec. 23.—The Adams Express Company settled yesterday with the Kirkpatrick Trust Company for the \$200,000 in coupon bonds of a Canadian lumber company which were destroyed by fire in the Express Company's car near Worcester last Friday morning. Others claim on account of the fire including one for \$4,000 worth of bank notes, will be paid by the company as they are established.

The loss of the company, it was said at the main office yesterday, would undoubtedly amount to \$240,000 unless something could be recovered on the notes and bonds destroyed. The company has no definite record by numbers of the notes or bonds in the consignment, but will make some effort to establish them.

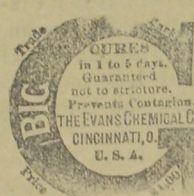
