

BOY DROWNED.

Alex. Menard, Aged
Six Years,

LOST HIS LIFE IN THE
OROMOCTO RIVER.

Belonged to Boston and
was Visiting in the
Village.

Alexander Menard, the six-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Menard of Boston, was the victim of a drowning accident at Oromocto, yesterday afternoon. The little fellow was playing with another child aged four years, on the shore of the Oromocto river, and by some chance fell into the water and was drowned. Some men were at work on the new bridge near by, but none of them witnessed the accident, nor heard the little fellow call for help. His playmate, who was the only person to witness the accident was not able to explain how it occurred. There was a small catamaran moored near the spot, and the supposition is that the Menard boy fell into the water while trying to get on board of it.

The little fellow was soon missed, and a search being instituted his body was found in a few feet of water quite close to the shore.

Coroner George Perley of Manguerville was called, and after learning the circumstances connected with the boy's death, decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

Mrs. Menard, with her two children, came to Oromocto from Boston a couple of weeks ago to visit her friend Mrs. William Bryson. The tragic death of her little son was naturally a terrible blow to her, and much sympathy is felt for her in the community. She accompanied the remains to this city by boat this afternoon and will proceed to Boston with them by this evening's train. Undertaker John G. Adams is looking after the arrangements.

Port Arthur has Fallen.

RUSSIAN CRUISERS CHASING SHIP
BOUND FOR CANADA.

Nagasaki, Japan, Aug. 6.—It is rumored here that Port Arthur has been captured by the Japanese.

London, Aug. 6.—The Daily Mirror says that two Russian cruisers have left the Baltic Sea, and are chasing a steamer which left England, July 30, for Canada, carrying ammunition for Yokohama, by way of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Grand Trunk Pacific.

Quebec, Aug. 6.—It is reported here in well informed quarters that the government will name a commission to construct the Grand Trunk Pacific and the chief engineer of the eastern section, immediately upon adjournment of parliament. Work on surveys will be pushed with great vigor. The appointment of chief engineer lies between Lumsden and Doucet. The latter is at present chief engineer of the Quebec and Lake St. John railway. Doucet is likely to get the job, as he is familiar with all the country between Quebec and Winnipeg.
