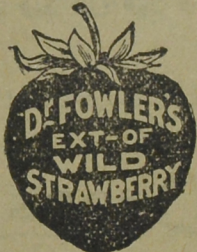

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SENDOFF FOR DUNDONALD.

Ottawa Said Good-bye to the General—
Montreal's Reception.

Ottawa, July 27.—Lord Dundonald left Ottawa last night on his way to England, where he has been called by the war office. A large crowd turned out to see him off.

Those in carriages, which were hired for the occasion, were Conservatives, principally members of parliament and others attending the session. There was an absence of Ottawa's leading citizens, outside of those who have been exploiting the noble earl for political purposes. The evening, however, was fine, and the crowd on the sidewalks leading to the depot was large. Following the example set in Toronto, the horses were unharnessed and willing hands pulled the vehicle with a rope.

As Lord Dundonald and Lady Cochrane boarded the train they were cheered.

There were no speeches at the residence of Lord Dundonald or at the station, but late last night a type-written statement was supplied to the press, in which it was stated that the train stopped, below the Laurier bridge, which is about a quarter of a mile outside the station yard, and there Mayor Ellis said a few parting words to Lord Dundonald.

Sir Sandford Fleming, Mr. Booth and J. A. MacDonell, the Conservative organizer of Glengarry, were said to be on the car when Mayor Ellis expressed regret that Lord Dundonald had to leave without finishing the work of organizing the militia.

Lord Dundonald is reported, in this typewritten statement, to have said in reply that he left Ottawa with deep regrets. The people were friends to him in his so-called prosperity, and they stuck to him in his adversity. He would always look with affection upon Canada and its people. The special train left about 8.30 for Montreal.

Montreal, July 27.—Lord Dundonald, when he reached Montreal at midnight, was met at the Grand Trunk station by a big crowd. An enthusiastic reception was arranged by the Caledonian and St. Andrew's Societies. When Lord Dundonald stepped from the train he was picked up and carried in procession to the Windsor Hotel, where demands were made for an address, and he expressed thanks for the reception. He declared it was evident that the militia of Canada would not stand to see the rights of the Union Jack interfered with.

To the Editor of The Herald,
Sir,—The Local Improvement Association I understand is composed of representative men, and have if I am rightly informed, by virtue of their charter the city aldermen associated with them; these two should make a very strong team and be a power in the community for civic betterment.

It has been said by some one who says he knows that many of the aldermen are opposed to granting money to an association to spend as they think best and gave as their reason that the council could do it much better.

We would ask why don't they do it. Can they put their finger on any one thing they have done or attempted to do along the line of improvement?

I could tell of dozens of things they leave undone that they ought to do, and take advantage of while the season lasts.

The question often comes to me, are we not sound asleep, do we really know what is going on and being done by the energetic people in other towns not as large as ours. We possess as much ability as they and just as good a field to work in.

The press should stir us up. True, in the past the press has been very kind to the association and called attention to the outdoor surroundings, civic betterment or town beautiful, or whatever title it may know are in certain evidence by leading articles from time to time. This is helpful and no doubt the people appreciate it.

This of itself is an educator and has assumed such proportions that it would be difficult to find an individual citizen not acquainted to some extent at least with the general question.

True, we require knowledge and practice as our present chairman of the roads and streets says, and he is a whole team, but the fact that the subject is an engrossing one, and that it is being voiced in our daily and weekly papers throughout the city and country, the length and breadth of the land should on the one hand promote an absorbing interest in so beneficial a movement, and on the other lead to the adoption of methods of imparting practical instruction to more rapidly secure the desired result.
