

COIL TIGHTENING.

Around the Conspirators in the Bogus Ballot Scandal.

LOTT EXPECTED TO RETURN AND STAND TRIAL..

A Police Magistrate Implicated.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Toronto, Nov. 29.—The prosecution in the bogus ballot box trial will be continued at Belleville next Friday and more sensational exposures are expected.

Inspector Chamberlain of the Dominion Secret Service, yesterday visited St. Michael's hospital, where Samuel Harryet, police magistrate, of Bancroft is undergoing treatment.

It is understood that Harryet will be called upon to answer a charge of conspiracy in connection with Lott and others.

Belleville, Ont., Nov. 29.—The magistrate yesterday received a telegram from B. O. Lott, dated Syracuse, N. Y., saying that he would return to Belleville and stand trial.

Lott says he will take his medicine rather than ruin three honest friends who furnished bail for him. He also alleges that other men are implicated.

Bail has been secured for all the prisoners except Reilly, the man who organized the manufacture of the bogus ballot boxes, and he is in jail seemingly without friends.

A warrant has been issued for Sam Harryet, the Bancroft police magistrate, implicated by the evidence of Editor Bremner.

YANKEE POCHERS.

Ten Vessels Seized for Illegal Fishing in Passamaquoddy Bay.

Eastport, Me., Nov. 29.—Ten American fishing craft, including eight sailing vessels and two steamboats, have been seized by the Canadian fisheries protective cruiser Carlew, and fined for illegal fishing in the Canadian waters of a tributary of Passamaquoddy Bay near St. George.

Three specific charges were preferred against the vessels, that is that they had fished on Sunday, that they had illegally caught fish in their possession and that they had seined illegally in Canadian waters.

For the first two offences each boat was fined \$100, and the last \$200. In addition to this all seines and fish were confiscated. It is understood that fines will be paid, and that the entire matter will be disposed of without involving any international question.

The aggregate value of the craft is about \$20,000. The seizure is the most extensive that has been made by a Canadian cruiser for many years. As the ear-dine season closes next Wednesday, and as there has been a marked scarcity of fish recently, it is alleged that the American fishermen were induced to carry on their occupation in the Canadian waters of Passamaquoddy Bay.

Washington, Nov. 29.—State department officials are not expecting the seizure of the American fishing vessels to be made an issue between the governments of Canada and the United States. So far nothing has been heard about the matter except the unofficial information contained in the Associated Press despatch, which indicates an amicable disposition of the matter. In the present instance the question of extra-territoriality appears not to have been raised and the vessels were not confiscated, which has happened in the case of seizures heretofore made—either of these features usually being sufficient to make the settlement of the controversy a matter of diplomatic negotiations.

NATIONALISM IN QUEBEC.

Hon. Mr. Prefontaine Making an Effort to Stamp it Out.

Montreal, Nov. 29.—It is understood that Hon. Raymond Prefontaine is about to enter upon a vigorous campaign to stamp out the germ of that so-called nationalism, which has made a considerable headway in this province of late. The Minister of Marine and Fisheries is a man who in his younger days believed Canada would sooner or later be absorbed in the American Republic, but this was before he had made a complete study of the Dominion resources. He now believes

in Canada as separate and apart from the United States, and the Minister also believes that the proper place for his own compatriots and the Dominion of Canada at large is within the British Empire.

When the South African war broke out Hon. Mr. Prefontaine did not hesitate for an instant and without consulting either his leader or his party friends placed himself immediately on record as a champion of the integrity and solidarity of the Empire. As a matter of fact the member for Maisonneuve has already expressed himself in private and will do so publicly ere long against the anti-British and anti-British sentiment.

To the credit of the French Canadian people the nationalist idea of contesting every county in Quebec narrowed itself down to Mr. Asselin in Terrebonne and thanks to Mr. Prefontaine's efforts that gentleman lost his deposit. It is understood, however, that the Minister of Marine will take an early opportunity of making a public utterance on the so-called nationalist issue, warning his fellow-countrymen against a policy that can only result to their disadvantage.
