

TORY ORATORS,

Who Have A Great
Acrobatic Record,

SENT AS SUBSTITUTES
FOR THE MEN WHO FLED.

Plenty of Hot Air Promised
for this Evening.

The Tories of York asked for corn and they are to receive only husks. They advertised Messrs. Casgrain Clarke to address a meeting in the opera house, but the desperate condition of the Tory cause in Quebec and Toronto demanded a cancellation of the contract, and Dr. Stockton and Mr. Macinerney are sent as substitutes.

These gentlemen do not need any introduction to Fredericton. They are known for their numerous acrobatic performances in the political ring, and for the number of times they have been turned down by the electors, and their denunciation of the government will not influence anybody.

Dr. Stockton started political life as a supporter of the Blair government and a Liberal, and it was not long before he jumped both political fences. His break with Mr. Blair, by some peculiar coincidence, occurred about the time a respectable Roman Catholic citizen of St. John was appointed police magistrate, and although the doctor has proclaimed that his change of heart was induced by cherished allegiance to the principle of "local responsible self government," other people call it an other name. The doctor was also an ardent Liberal but suddenly forsook his traditions and party allegiance, developing into a most extreme and unreasoning Tory. He was the Opposition leader in the Legislature for some years, and in the elections of 1899 piloted his party into political oblivion, only one of the fourteen escaping defeat at the hands of the people. Then he essayed to enter the federal arena and was beaten in the contest of 1900 by several hundred majority, disappearing under the same avalanche that buried Mr. Foster in St. John. If the Tories succeed to power, Dr. Stockton will expect a supreme court judgeship, hence his present devotion to the Tory cause.

Mr. Macinerney bears the distinction of having made more somersaults than any other politician in Canada. Starting as a Liberal he ran several unsuccessful elections with that party, then he became an independent, and finally landed in the Tory party. His electoral defeats cannot be numbered on the fingers of one hand. He was defeated for the House of Commons in Kent in 1878, 1882, 1887, 1888 and 1900, and for the legislature in St. John in 1902, so that the electors have not shown any great appreciation of his ambition to conduct their affairs.

Personally both Dr. Stockton and Mr. Macinerney are very estimable gentlemen and in that respect we haven't a word to say of them but what is good, but we feel it a public duty to warn the voters of this city not to be influenced by anything these gentlemen may say this evening against the government. You have no way of knowing whether the gentlemen mean what they say. They are liable to change their political opinions at any time, and the indignation they express against the Liberal party may a short time hence be turned against the Conservatives. Both are eloquent speakers and good fellows, but neither is taken seriously when he cuts loose on the political stump. They are the light wine of politics, effervescent, pleasant for the moment, but ineffective and soon forgotten.

P. S.—A wingless message at 4 p. m. from St. John says Dr. Stockton has repented and is not coming. An alarming report is current that he has suddenly turned Liberal.
