(Special Correspondence to The Herald.)

Oct. 3.—Lost, strayed or stolen. Any person will be rewarded who will tell us where we can find a month or six weeks of nice autumn weather, for the benefit of the farming community and I suppose politicians would appreciate a few weeks of it just now.

On the 22nd of Sept. we had a light flurry of snow and some extremely cold and wet weather before and since, making it very difficult to harvest grain in any kind of decent condition. Oats, when threshed, probably will be found to be very light in weight, as I have seen many large fields of green grain, not only in Sunbury but Queens and Kings County as well. Grain could not fill well after such hard freezing. A scarcity of panicles is predicted for this winter. I was told a few days ago in Kings County that one man had turned his cattle out into an eleven acre field of buckwheat after the heavy frost of Sept. 9th. Another man in Queens County told me he had ploughed under four acres, and still another said he did not figure on more than forty bushels of seven or eight acres, and reports generally are about the same. It will come hard on the less independent class of farmers, more so now that wheat flour has gone up in price.

Rev. W. H. Smith, successor to Rev. N. B. Rogers in the pastorate of the Baptist churches, has got settled and seems to be well liked by his congregation. Mr. Rogers is taking a theological course at Newton, Mass. The Baptist church had a picnic for the Sunday school on grounds adjoining the church the 26th Sept.

Rev. E. W. Gardner, Episcopal missionary in Labrador, is spending a few days at Butternut Grove.

Our enterprising general workman, Messrs. Moxon & Mahoney, have purchased a new Dedrick hay press, and are now taking contracts for pressing hay. This press puts up a bale much superior to the old loose bales for shipping, but not considered so good for feeding purposes.

We will soon be in a position to claim that Maugerville is a sportsman's paradise. Messrs. Thos. E. Bridges our local nimrod and an English guide Teddy Davis each procured a moose a few days ago less than five miles from here; the heads were not good specimens for mounting. Louis Saabie an Indian shot another at about the same time and place. They were away from home only three days. F. W. Barker post master at Sheffield Academy while waiting for duck a few days ago, a short distance from his home shot and killed another with a load of duck shot. The prohibition of partridge shooting is considered to be of great advantage to big game hunters about here. There is not the continual banging to frighten big game which also shows that the laws respecting partridge is observed.

Messrs. A. and C. A. Harrison and W. M. Thurott pretty nearly swept again the board with farm and garden produce at the recent St. John fair. The Messrs. Harrison won \$71.50 and Mr. Thurott \$70.50 in prizes. This speaks well for the soil of Maugerville, but due credit must be given this exhibition, for much hard work and considerable knowledge of plants and plant good is required. Miss M. E. Harrison who has been visiting her brother at Butternut Grove, leaves for Toronto again in a few days to resume city missionary work in connection with the Church of the Epiphany.

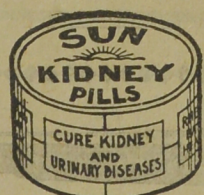

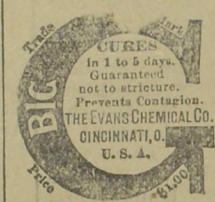
