LAURIER AROUSED.

The latest effort of the Tory party to prejudice the country against Sir Wilfrid Laurier because of alleged disloyalty to British institutions, in that by a slip of the tongue, he referred to Lord Dundonald as a foreigner, was indignantly repelled by the Premier in a speech of great spirit and eloquence, which he delivered Friday night in the House of Commons.

Sir Wilfred expressed surprised that his opponents should be so small and mean as to seize on such an incident to make capital against him, but he was aware that it is not the first time that the Tories have sought to arouse race animosity against him. The manner in which he laid his opponents out, and vindicated himself will probably be a warning to his opponents for the future. To Dr. Sproul, who owes his position in the Tory party to the species of warfare that is being waged against the premier. Sir Wilfred spoke in no uncertain sound when interrupted by the Orange grandmaster, and his observations in this connection will apply generally to the Tory party, which has never ceased to discredit the leader of the government because he is a French Canadian and a Roman Catholic.

The course pursued by the Tories is a shame and a disgrace, and is calculated to bring about disunion and prejudice among the Canadian people, and destroy the effect of the effort Sir Wilfred has always made to keep down race and religious disputes in this country.

LAST SAD TRIBUTE.

Remains of Late Major Forester Laid to Rest at Forest Hill.

The remains of the late Major William Forester of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, arrived here by the western train this morning and were laid to rest in Forest Hill cemetery this afternoon with military honors.

Capt. MacMillan of the R. C. D., accompanied the remains from Toronto, being met at Fredericton Junction by Postmaster Hilyard. Undertaker John G. Adams was at the depot to receive the remains and have them removed to Christ Church Cathedral.

The funeral took place at 2:30 o'clock, and was attended by a large number of prominent citizens. A very impressive service was conducted by the Lord Bishop, assisted by Rev. Dean Partridge, the choir rendering appropriate music.

At the conclusion of the service the remains which were incased in a massive oak casket with oxidized brass mountings, were placed on a maxim gun carriage drawn by two coal black horses each led by a soldier. The casket was covered by the Union Jack and the sword and helmet worn by the deceased were given a conspicuous place.

The funeral cortege was then formed with the band of the R. C. R. in the lead and proceeded to the cemetery to the solemn strains of Webster's funeral march.

The pall bearers were Lieut. Col. Loggie Major Bridges, Capt. Nagle, Lieut. and Horetsky and Lieut. Dadomain. The chief mourners were Postmaster Hilyard, Councillor Grosvenor, J. C. Allen, Colonel Wadmore and Capt. McMillan, who preceded a detachment of non-coms. and men from the R. C. I. Other mourners included A. H. F. Randolph, George Y. Dibblee, T. B. Winslow, E. E. Winslow, M. S. L. Richey, T. C. Allen and E. H. McAlpine, K. C.

Many beautiful floral offerings accompanied the casket from Toronto and a number were added by Fredericton friends. The list included a beautiful wreath from the non-coms. and men of the Royal Canadian Dragoons.

The services at the grave were conducted by Rev. Dean Partridge, and John G. Adams was funeral director.

GREAT WORK!

Japs Sank a Russian Battleship.

Tokio, June 25.—Admiral Togo, reports that on Thursday last June 23, his patrol boat discovered the battleship Peresviet and several other vessels accompanied by nine torpedo boat destroyers near the entrance of Port Arthur harbour.

He was warned by wireless telegraph, and he immediately advanced his entire fleet except those engaged upon special duty.

The Admiral then discovered that the Russian fleet which consisted of six battleships and five cruisers and fourteen destroyers, evidently planned a dash southward by sundown.

The Russians stopped outside the entrance to the harbour, and after nightfall a fleet of Japanese torpedo boat destroyers resolutely attacked the Russian ships, and succeeded in torpedoing and sinking a battleship of the Peresviet type and disabled the battleship Sevastopol.

A cruiser of the Dianna type was observed being towed into the harbour on Friday morning, and it was evident she had sustained serious damage.

The Japanese ships sustained little damage. The torpedo boat destroyer Shirakumo, was hit by a shell, which fell in the cabin and had three men killed, and three others wounded.

The Chidori, a vessel of the same class was hit behind the engine room but no casualties resulted therefrom.

Torpedo boats sixty-four and sixty-nine, were slightly damaged.

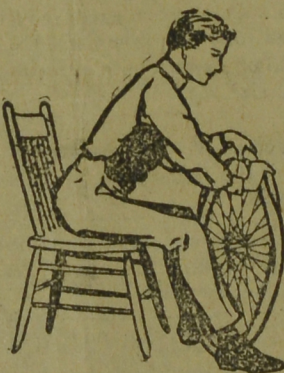
