

CIVIC AFFAIRS.

Meeting of City Council in Committee Last Evening.

SHARP DISCUSSION OVER OPERA HOUSE MATTERS.

New Method of Building Sidewalks Will Not be Tried This Year.

The monthly committee meeting of the city council last evening, was attended by Mayor Palmer and Alds. Farrell, Everett, Stockford, Ross, Maxwell, McKnight, Edwards and Barbour.

A large number of accounts, contracted during the month of May, were carefully gone over and passed after considerable discussion.

A communication was read from the chief commissioner, stating that the city's offer to purchase the government road plant for \$3,600, had been accepted.

It was decided to send Roadmaster McKay and Electrician McGinn to St. John to examine the plant before taking it over.

There was a sharp discussion over the street sprinkling service, brought on by Ald. Farrell, and it was finally agreed to engage another horse and driver for the second watering cart.

Ald. Farrell pointed out that one of the carts was lying idle while citizens were complaining of the unsatisfactory service.

A communication was read from the Granoluthia Sidewalk Company, stating that the representatives is now in Pictou, and the council wished to have him build a sample sidewalk, a carload of cement should at once be ordered either through R. Chestnut & Sons or James S. Neill.

The communication brought on some discussion and it was pointed out that material for new sidewalks had already been purchased, sufficient to absorb the appropriation set aside for the purpose. The committee decided not to give the new method a trial this year, and the city clerk was instructed to so inform the company.

Accounts from the scene shifters at the Opera House, amounting to \$45, were submitted and brought on a warm discussion.

Ald. Farrell did not think it was necessary to employ four men at the Opera House at such a high rate of pay. If it was necessary, the council should increase the rental of the Opera House instead of trying to reduce it. When the council pay \$5 a night for stage hands, \$5 for gas and \$5 for a license fee, there is not much left even in warm weather when fuel is not used.

The committee finally decided to recommend payment of accounts.

A TRAGEDY

One Man Shot Another on the Street at Port Arthur

AND IMMEDIATELY DISAPPEARED IN THE RUSH.

Port Arthur, Ont., June 7.—The Whitefield Bros. of Fort William, were in a wagon last evening and saw from a distance two men engaged in a scuffle at the corner of Fort William and Duchiquin Streets and then saw the smoke from a revolver shot, but did not notice an explosion.

When they arrived on the scene, one man was lying with his feet in a ditch, and his back bent over a culvert, where he was held by the other clutching his throat.

The brothers drew up their horse, jumped to the road and rushed forward to the struggling men.

Instantly releasing his hold, the murderer sprang to his feet and confronted them with a revolver, threatening to shoot if they advanced.

Then holding his captors at bay he slowly backed away for about 75 yards, when he turned, jumped the ditch, and disappeared into the thick bushes.

The man who was shot, was brought to town and immediately taken to the hospital, where he died before he could be removed from the stretcher.

The man was an Italian, as was his murderer, but there was nothing on the body by which to identify him.

The police are searching for the murderer.
