

RUSSIA SPURNS

Intervention in the War and Will Fight to the End.

GETTING READY TO DOUBLE TRACK SIBERIAN RAILWAY.

Britain's Representation on North Sea Commission.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Washington, Nov. 15.—The Russian ambassador here stated that Russia will spurn intervention, and will fight to the end.

London, Nov. 15.—Vice Admiral Sir Lewis A. Beaumont, formerly commander in chief of the Australian station, has been appointed British representative on the North Sea commission.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 15.—The Siberian railway is to be double tracked. Work will be commenced at once at an enormous expense.

It is reported that the Japanese have captured the east Keekwan Pass, which will give the Japanese control of Port Arthur from the east.

Tokio, Nov. 14.—A refugee who left Port Arthur on Monday, reports that the Japanese fire is increasing. All the Russian warships in the harbor have received severe damage. On October 30 two hospital ships and on Nov. 1 a third was struck by the indirect fire of the Japanese and sank immediately. All on board the three vessels were lost. An official report says the Russians are burning ammunition and exploding magazines.

Tsingtau, Nov. 14.—The British steamer Thales of the Douglas line has been purchased by German residents of Tsingtau and has been given a German register. She is now loading here for Port Arthur. Local shipping houses have received information that two steamers which recently left here with supplies for Vladivostok, have arrived there in safety. It is also known here definitely that several supply ships have reached Port Arthur within the last fortnight.

Paris, Nov. 13.—The Echo de Paris states that the Russian naval general staff confirms a report that an English steamship, carrying 3,000 tons of ammunition, has run the blockade of Port Arthur.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 12.—A corrected casualty list of the ten-day battle of the Skakne River, issued by the War office, places killed or wounded at 33,350, of whom 900 were officers. The first returns it is explained, contained duplications, and some of the men were so slightly wounded that they returned to the ranks in a few days.

The Freight War.

It is reported that the Governor Dingley will come here, making three steamers on the run between St. John and Boston.

TO ESCAPE POVERTY.

Two Sisters Committed Suicide Leaving a Strange Bequest.

New York, Nov. 15.—Locked in each other's arms on the bare floor of a dismantled flat in East 51st street, from which they had been dispossessed on Friday, two sisters, Louise and Valerie Abel, 44 and 38 years of age respectively, were found dead yesterday. In the mouth of each was a rubber tube, which connected with the chandelier.

In the hand of the younger woman was an open letter, written in German which stated that the sisters had decided to die together, after talking over the matter for a week, and requested that they be buried in one grave.

"For this consideration," the letter continued, "we give our bodies for the benefit of medical science."

The two women had failed to pay the rent for the flat they occupied, and on Friday were dispossessed. At the same time their furniture, which they had bought from an instalment company, had been taken from them, and they had been given permission by the janitor to remain in the flat over Sunday.

St. Columbian's Sacred Oak.

In years gone by Ireland had a sacred oak dedicated to St. Columbian, one of the peculiarities of the tree being that whoever carried a small bit of the wood or bark in his mouth would never meet with a violent death, it being especially efficacious in saving Christian martyrs from the block. It was known throughout the British Isles as the Holy Oak of Kenmare. After the lapse of many centuries this sacred oak was uprooted by a storm, after which it was said to be guarded by angels to keep heretics from gathering the wood for fuel. At last a wicked tanner "barked" one of its largest limbs and tanned some leather, which he made into shoes for himself, imagining that such relics would bring him wealth and power. He wore them but once, however, but that one time was enough to make him an incurable leper.

Hours of Sleep.

Though insomnia is distressing and very bad for health, many people sleep too much. Too much sleep is harmful, and even a newborn infant ought not to be allowed to spend all its time in slumber. Between one and two years of age a child needs sixteen to eighteen hours of sleep; from three to four years it requires fourteen to sixteen hours; from four to six years it ought to have thirteen to fifteen hours; from six to nine years it should have ten to twelve hours, and from nine to thirteen years the proper allowance of sleep is eight to ten hours. After the completion of growth the sleep allowance can be brought down safely to six or eight hours.

Englishwomen's Feet.

The evidence of ladies' outfitters affords direct proof of the improvement in physique of modern woman. "Most decidedly," said the manager of a Regent street firm, "our lady customers require larger sizes than they did ten years ago. Formerly we stocked nothing larger than 5, and it was the average size. Now we keep 7s, and during last year even 8s, and 9s is the average size of boots. Gloves, hosiery, and underwear are all being sold in the West End in larger sizes than ten years ago."—St. James' Gazette.
