

BALTIMORE MOB

Chased Cardinal Gibbons Into Priest's House,

AND POLICE WERE CALLED TO RESTORE ORDER.

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 14.—When Cardinal Gibbons, in the face of a terrific snow storm yesterday afternoon, went to the Polish Catholic Church of St. Stanislaus, to administer the rite of confirmation, he met with a hostile reception.

Recently he removed Father Morris from the pastorate, because the priest had caused the arrest of Father Wisok, formerly his assistant, now pastor of a church at Scranton, Penn., on the charge of writing improper letters to a young woman, the housekeeper at the rectory.

Under the church law, a priest could not institute criminal proceedings against another priest.

The charges were withdrawn. Father Morris' congregation protested against his removal without avail. Father Marzenski succeeded him.

The Cardinal yesterday afternoon found an excited crowd of Poles awaiting him in front of the church. He hurried from his carriage into the priests' house adjoining. The mob followed him.

Father Marzenski escorted the Cardinal to another apartment, while the crowd broke up furniture in the reception room.

The police were summoned, but the crowd locked them out. A priest dropped a key down to them from a window. Half a dozen policemen then entered and stopped the riot. After the crowd was dispersed the Cardinal returned home. Last night he declined to discuss the incident.

MORE LAWYERS.

Attorneys and Barristers Sworn in Before the Supreme Court.

Eleven young men from different sections of the province was admitted attorneys at the Supreme Court this morning, and two others were sworn in as barristers.

His Honor Justice Gregory presided, and Mr. J. D. Phinney, K. C., on behalf of the Barristers' Society, moved the admission of the candidates. The oath was administered by Mr. T. C. Allen, K. C., clerk of the court.

A. H. NOTMAN DEAD.

Well Known C. P. R. Official Passed Away on a Railway Train.

News of the death of Mr. A. H. Notman former C. P. R. district passenger agent at St. John and recently filling a similar position at Toronto, is heard with deep regret by many Fredericton friends.

Mr. Notman has been suffering from tuberculosis, and recently was granted leave of absence. He left Toronto on Oct. 11th for Los Angeles, Cal. where he has a brother, in the hope that the Southern climate would benefit his health. It was found, however, that he got no better, and as the worst was feared, he left for his Toronto home a day or two ago. It was, however, too late, and Mr. Notman passed away on the train.

Mr. Notman was considered one of the best officers in the employ of the C. P. R. He entered the offices in Montreal about twenty years ago, and was for some years rate clerk in the passenger traffic manager's office. In 1895 he was appointed to the position of district passenger agent for the Atlantic division, with office in St. John. Mr. Notman remained in St. John until he was promoted to his recent position in Toronto in 1899.

Mr. Notman was about forty-four years

of age. He leaves a wife and five sons, all living in Toronto.

KINGSCLEAR ASSAULT CASE.

Frank Good on Trial Charged With Stabbing Paul Beataugh.

The trial of Frank Good, who is charged with assaulting and wounding Paul Beataugh of Kingsclear, was commenced before Judge Wilson under the Speedy Trials Act at the County court this morning. The accused on being arraigned pleaded not guilty to the charge. J. H. Barry, K. C. appeared for the crown, and A. R. Sipp for the prisoner.

Mr. Beataugh, the victim of the assault, was the first witness examined. His story in brief was that while driving near his home he was set upon by the prisoner and his father, Charles Good, and pretty roughly handled. While he was lying upon the ground, the prisoner drew a knife and stabbed him in the left side.

Dr. G. J. McNally, who was next called testified that Beataugh had been stabbed in the left side with a knife, the blade of which had penetrated the lung. He considered the wound a dangerous one at the time.

Mr. James Mills, who brought the injured man to the city for surgical treatment, was called to the stand and corroborated Beataugh's testimony to some extent. He was not present when the row started.

The case for the crown was closed at noon.

This afternoon Charles Good, father of the accused, was called for the defence, and fully contradicted the evidence of Beataugh. He claimed that he had been assaulted by Beataugh, and defended himself as best he could. He finally threw his assailant down, and was holding him down when his son interfered and pulled him off. Beataugh had called him names and had declared that he could whip all the Goods in Kingsclear. He denied positively that he had seen his son make use of a knife while the scuffle was going on. He admitted that he had not been on friendly terms with Beataugh for some time.

Mrs. Charles Good, mother of the accused, also gave evidence for the defence.

Captain Ryan, of Kentville, N. S., who returned to Victoria, B. C., from the Orient in September, from studying the war, has mysteriously disappeared. Ryan was in the South African war, and is a son of J. W. Ryan, Sir Frederick Borden's opponent in the recent election in King's, N. S.

QUEBEC'S NEW JUDGES.

One of Them a Native of Halifax.

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—Mr. Matthew Hutchinson, ex M. P. for St. Antoine Division, Montreal, will succeed Judge White as judge of the Superior Court in the district of St. Francis. Judge White is in ill-health.

Mr. Hutchinson is a well known figure in legal circles in Montreal. He is a son of William Scott Hutchinson, and was born at Halifax, N. S., Oct. 29, 1843.

Three Rivers, Que., Nov. 15.—Mr. R. S. Cooke, advocate, of this city, and ex-M. P. for Three Rivers, has been appointed judge of the Superior Court for the district of Three Rivers, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Justice Desmarais last summer.
