### Foster Going to Defeat in North Toronto.

### DUNDONALD'S CONSCRIPTION PROPOSALS.

Mr. Foster is completely divorced from New Brunswick.

Nomination in Dawson takes place Nov. 18 and polling Dec. 16.

Something is likely to drop in St. John newspaper circles early next week.

The Tories are on the run already. Clarke and Casgrain started the sprinting when they made such haste for home.

The McLeods are keeping both hands on the nomination in York and haven't time to look after the Union Jack.

Even Mr. Pinder is said to have been ashamed of the Tory meeting at the opera house, and that is saying a great deal.

York Liberals will nominate their candidate for the Commons at the Y. M. C. A. Hall, York street, tomorrow at 2 p. m.

Annapolis Liberals have nominated Mr. Pickup, a very popular man, who will hold the constituency. His Tory opponent is Mr. Shafer.

R. L. Richardson, ex-M. P., editor of the Winnipeg Tribune, is to oppose Mr. Sifton in Brandon. Richardson is a renegade Liberal defeated in the last election.

The Liberals of Charlotte have nominated Daniel Gilmore, son of the late Hon. A. H. Gilmore, and are preparing to make it very hot for Mr. Ganong.

The Northumberland Liberal convention meets next Friday, and the nomination will probably go to either Mr. Morrissey, M. P. P., or Mr. W. S. Loggie, M. P. P.

Mr. Borden was to be banquetted at Toronto Oct. 10, but has asked to be excused. He is a very busy man just now, and is going to keep at it till he drops on Nov. 3.

Dr. McLeod forgot all about prohibition at the opera house meeting. Probably his speech was prepared when he thought Mr. Clarke of Toronto would be present.

A. W. Wright, one of the Tory organizers for Ontario, was coming down to start the Tory campaign in Nova Scotia, but his engagement is cancelled. He is needed at home like Clarke and Casgrain.

The farmers of York would rather hear the rumble of the Transcontinental trains through this county than the oratorical gymnastics of McLeod or the stupendous exaggerations of Mr. Ossie Crockett.

When Mr. Borden was speaking at the Toronto Tory meeting Tuesday night, at every mention of Laurier's name the Tory leader was interrupted by the wild cheers of a large part of the audience.

At the North Toronto Tory convention last night Mr. Foster was offered and accepted nomination for parliament. The Liberals will nominate their man tonight, and he will be Mayor Urquhart.

The Tories, who are weeping over the proposed Liberal expenditure of \$13,000,000 for the transcontinental railway, gave the C. P. R. absolutely 65,000,000 acres of valuable land and \$25,000,000 in cash.

Mr. Macinerney didn't create any sensation in Fredericton. The Herald put the people onto his political curves, before he arrived here. As a political force he is a back number like the twin St. John doctors.

Mr. Foster did not dare risk his chances in any New Brunswick constituency, and is seeking what he thinks is a safe seat in Toronto. He thought North Ontario, with its 500 Tory majority, was safe, but was promptly undeceived.

Mr. Powell did not want to run in Westmorland, but the man the Tories were after declined the sacrifice, and Mr. Powell has to step into the gap, with the promise of something substantial if the Tories win. Mr. Powell will look like 30 cents when the ballots are counted.

Hon. Joe Martin declares that he has no intention of opposing Ralph Smith, Liberal-Labor candidate in Nanaimo, B. C., and that he will not be in the province during the campaign. The statements that he would be in the field were made originally from Nanaimo, where the enemies of Mr. Ralph Smith hoped to divide the Liberal forces in the way suggested. The rumor had no foundation in fact, however.

The Montreal Star says: "Mr. Borden very trenchantly declares he would rather be right and defeated than wrong and become premier." Mr. Borden needn't worry; the people of Canada know he is wrong and that is why he will be defeated. His assumption of such a high moral tone, however, is hypocritical, when he knows that every corrupt method possible will be employed in his behalf. The record of the Tory party is one long string of electoral debauches.

Toronto, Oct. 6.—T. C. Robinette, Liberal candidate in Centre Toronto, addressing his electors last night, said he was in the fight to win, not only for himself, but for his great Liberal leader. Sir Wilfrid Laurier had said to him in Ottawa that it would be a miracle if a Liberal were elected in Toronto. Mr. Robinette urged his hearers to put forth their best efforts that they might telegraph their leader on the night of Nov. 3 that this miracle had been wrought in Centre Toronto.

Mr. Ossie Crockett should not be so hard on the newspaper men of Fredericton, because he is a member of the profession himself. Mr. Crockett has been very glad to draw a couple of dollars a week for the past decade or more as Fredericton correspondent of the St. John Globe, and is still at work in that capacity. Mr. Crockett attempts to fasten the terms "Lilliputian and picayune" on the journalists of this city, and we suppose if he were referring to lawyers of a certain class with which he should be familiar he would call them police court shysters. It's an awful thing to have a swelled head.

### Under a Liberal Tariff.

In 1896 the firm of Rhodes, Curry & Co., car builders of Amherst, N. S., employed 250 men; today they employ over 3,000. In 1896 they paid in wages \$87,000; last year they paid \$480,000. In 1896 their output was \$415,000; last year it was \$2,700,000. The Robb Engineering Co. in 1896 employed 140 hands; today they have on their pay roll nearly 500. The business done in 1896 was \$163,000; last year it was over \$400,000. The wages paid in 1896 was \$37,000; last year it was over \$125,000. These are only samples, other industries could be quoted to show the great growth that had been experienced during the past eight years of Liberal rule.

### Victory Assured.

Laurier will go back to parliament with a bigger majority than ever. Nobody is kicking. Wages are good. Sifton has transformed the Interior Department. Immigration to the Canadian West has increased 900 per cent. since '96. Dakota and Minnesota are sending hundreds of thousands of well-to-do farmers into Canada. Then see what Mulock has done. We have the only Post Office Department in the world, besides England's, that pays. Canada's growth since '96 is figured in the postoffice and the penny stamp. Take the railway department. Who doubts that the G. T. P. will be a boon to Canada? Look at the money it will put into circulation. And who are the authors of it? The Liberals.

### The Growth of Population.

The Liberal government has advertised all over the world. Look at the result. The stream of population began to flow into Canada with the Klondike discoveries of 1897. In 1897-98 there were 20,016 immigrants; in 1898-99, 30,742; in 1899-00, 44,543; in 1900-01, 49,149; in 1901-02, 67,379; in 1902-03, 128,364; in 1903-4, 130,330. In other words, 515,220 souls have been added to the population since the Liberal government came into power in 1896. That is a greater number than there were in the whole North-west in 1896.

### Dundonald's Amendments.

In place of the old provision that "The period of service in the active militia in time of peace shall be three years."

Lord Dundonald suggested that "The period of compulsory service in the army in time of peace shall be three years, but when hostilities are threatened this service may be extended for a year."

And also that

"All the male youths in Canada between the ages of fourteen and eighteen years shall perform not less than 100 drills of one hour under regulations as may be made."

His champions indignantly deny that this is "conscription."

Well, then, what is it? And what is "conscription?"

Not that it matters much, except as showing how little the gentleman knew about Canada, and how much all the fuss about him is waste of emotion that ought to be reserved for more deserving objects.

### Fighting Tories.

Quebec, Oct. 6.—Notwithstanding the interest manifested by both political parties in the district of Quebec over the general elections, the work of organization is progressing slowly. The Conservatives are looking for strong candidates to place in the different constituencies, but up to the present have not been able to obtain the men they are after.

There is undoubtedly considerable dissatisfaction within the rank and file over the leadership. Hon. L. P. Pelletier and Senator Landry, who are apparently pushing themselves forward as the leading organizers, have not the unanimous support of the party by any means. They are in a measure mistrusted, not on account of their loyalty, but because the more respectable element do not wish them, and would very much prefer the Hon. E. J. Flynn, leader of the Opposition in the Local Legislature, to come to the front and take charge. Mr. Flynn is both ready and willing to do the work, but there is a clique opposed to him who are behind the more aggressive methods of Messrs. Pelletier and Landry, and unless some understanding is arrived at very shortly to alleviate the situation, the Conservative cause in the district of Quebec will suffer very very materially.

### Unexcelled Record.

The world of today shows no such record of material advancement, of abounding prosperity, as is shown by Canada under the Laurier government. The trade statistics of all nations prove that Canadian trade expansion during the past eight years has been greater per capita than that of any other nation. This applies only to foreign trade, but there is not the least doubt that the expansion in domestic trade has been quite as great as in foreign commerce. Labor has been fully employed; bank deposits have increased to a wonderful degree; the face of our cities has been changed by the erection of thousands of structures—factories, warehouses, dwellings and public buildings; a flood of population from Europe and the United States has been pouring over the West that so long called in vain to the settler; the great national transcontinental railway every foot of it on Canadian soil from Atlantic to Pacific has been undertaken, and railway building has proceeded upon a scale unknown since the completion of the C. P. R. In every department of industry and commerce, stagnation, indifference and fear have given place to strenuous activity, alertness and unbounded faith in the future of the Dominion.

## OPPOSING LEADERS.

### Canada Will Find no Difficulty

### IT PREFERRING LAURIER TO BORDEN.

### The Premier's Splendid Record.

When one considers the proposition in cold blood, it is difficult to believe it possible that the Canadian people should choose Mr. Borden in place of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. According to the Conservative leader all the admirable qualities he undoubtedly possesses, even rate him at the high valuation put upon his talents by enthusiastic supporters, and his standing is still a long way below that of the Prime Minister.

Mr. Borden's development has been so to say, unnaturally forced. In his first parliament he attracted some little attention in the House, none at all out of it. He left Ottawa an unknown member, and came back leader of the Conservative party. He had all the rules of the game to learn, while at the same time he was supposed to be teaching them to his followers. His parliamentary form was far from being the best. He was

### Cold, Scrap-booky, Technical.

It had been patent to the shrewd observers of the press gallery that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has taken a certain degree of interest in watching, and even in aiding, the development of his nominal rival into a notable parliamentary figure. It has never been done in a way that any friend of Mr. Borden's could resent, and indeed no friend of Mr. Borden's ever thought of objecting to a passing display of friendly interest on the part of the Prime Minister. Sir John Macdonald used to show a similar friendship for Sir Wilfrid, and no Liberal thought of objecting, for at the time the prestige of Sir John was almost as much superior to that of his young opponent as the prestige of Sir Wilfrid is now superior to that of his opponent. Not quite, though, for before he was made leader of the Liberal party Sir Wilfrid had served a long apprenticeship. He had been in the Cabinet with the Mackenzie and Cartwright. He had been

consulted by all. He showed immediately the result of his training in the apparent ease with which he turned the minority that came back from the elections of 1891 into a fighting force whose hard work resulted in the disintegration of the Conservative government and the triumphant return of the Liberal party in 1896. It is enough to watch the progress of a single debate in the House of Commons to realize how thorough a master of parliamentary practice the Prime Minister is. And his superiority in that part of his work is only a measure, a symbol, of his superiority in the more difficult work of statesmanship.

In every act of his official career Sir Wilfrid has been a worthy representative of a hardy, confident, ambitious people. When he met the American plenipotentiaries at the outset of his term of office, he made it clear to everybody on this continent that nothing could induce him to adopt any position inconsistent

### With the National Dignity of Canada.

When, later, he was asked by Mr. Chamberlain to discuss the political, military, and trade relations of the colonies and Great Britain, he insisted with even greater firmness that the practical independence we in Canada enjoy left nothing to be desired in the way of political change, that such military measures as were found to be desirable could be taken on our own initiative after friendly consultation with the Imperial authorities, and that only on the question of improvement of trade relations was there need for conference and discussion. To this position he has since adhered. He is today, as for years past, prepared to consider the terms of a treaty of commerce between Canada and Great Britain. And if he has proudly asserted the dignity of Canada and rigidly insisted upon the recognition of her national rights when, away from home, made national unity and national progress the keynote of his policy, he has given Canada

so clean that a dozen Conservative committees, ostentatiously appointed by Mr. Borden last session, failed to bring out the first item of scan-

dals such as brought disgrace upon the Conservative government during a whole parliamentary term. He has dealt resolutely with the tariff problem, and has made good his promise that under a Liberal administration Canadian industry would not suffer. He has given free rein to his colleagues on all their projects for the better organization of commerce and transportation. And he has crowned a great administration by carrying through parliament a measure which will result in widening the inhabited area of Canada, which will throw open new sections of country, new agricultural, forest and mineral areas capable of enormously increasing the national wealth.

It would indeed be a reproach to the political wisdom of a free and intelligent democracy if, at the very height of his influence as a statesman, at the very height of his effectiveness as an instrument for the upbuilding of the nation, at the very time when popular confidence in his wisdom and his integrity had made his authority over others supreme and his direction more valuable than ever before, he should be replaced by one whose influence is as yet only in the development stage, who exercises little or no personal authority, who has no support from men of national reputation, and who on no way compares with Laurier as a spokesman of the Canadian people.
