SOME WESTERN CANDIDATES.

Occasionally we are told in the Tory newspapers what great things Mr. Borden and his party expect to accomplish in the west when the federal elections occur, but Liberals who live beyond Lake Superior are not at all dismayed by the Tory prophecies of victory.

Nowhere in Canada unless it be in New Brunswick and Quebec is the government stronger than in the west, and the Liberals there are perfecting their organization and selecting their candidates in readiness for the contest whenever it may occur.

Good work was done last week in these respects and the gentlemen nominated to carry the Liberal banner are leaders in their respective constituencies and have little fear of the result of the elections.

At Winnipeg one hundred and fifty Liberal delegates assembled in the Young Men's Liberal Club hall to select a candidate for Winnipeg city. The gathering was enthusiastic, and a determination was expressed by all speakers to return a straight Liberal candidate. Ex-Ald. D. W. Bole, a leading business man, was nominated on the first ballot. Mr. Bole accepted in a fighting speech, referring to the great progress of western Canada under Liberal rule, and the long continued prosperity sure to accompany the advent of the Grand Trunk Pacific. Mr. Bole has occupied many important positions in Winnipeg municipal life, and has been president of the Winnipeg Liberal Association for several years.

Provencher Liberals have named Mr. J. C. Cyr, a former member of the Manitoba Legislature, who is almost certain to capture this old-time Tory constituency from Mr. Lariviere. English and French are united on Mr. Cyr, and he will poll a strong vote in both town and country.

Malcolm Mackenzie, Liberal candidate for Alberta, is a leading barrister of Macleod. The nominating convention was the largest ever held at Lethbridge, and Mr. Mackenzie's election by several hundred majority is assured.

The candidate in Calgary is Dr. C. J. Stewart of Calgary, of the firm of Mackie & Stewart. A Calgary despatch says the candidate chosen is an ideal one. He is not yet thirty years of age and the most popular young man in the city. He is the embodiment of all that is honorable and upright, and is a strong force in social circles.

Mr. Chamberlain's wail that the Mother Country's trade is languishing, that a crisis is at hand, is somewhat disproved by the latest board of trade returns. The statement shows: Increases of \$20,745,000 in imports and \$2,020,000 in exports. The total of trade for the year, adding exports and imports, reached the huge sum of \$4,516,768,205, or \$125,000,000 above the previous record. Taking exports alone, the total \$1,802,235,000, is \$56,042,685 better than in 1902, the previous highest. Manufactures alone account for \$36,772,100 of the increase. In imports the heaviest increase is in food, amounting to \$40,510,000. Raw materials came next, with \$22,569,000, and then manufactured articles, \$20,895,000.

We may have bribery and corruption in Canadian elections, but we have not yet reached the condition of terrorism that is sometimes reached in such contests in the Southern States. A despatch from Memphis, Tennessee says: "The result of Friday's election is still in doubt. Late developments show that the election was signalized by the most irregular and riotous scenes connected with any local political contest of recent years. In the

Ninth Ward the ballot-box was stolen, the ballots burned, and two men shot, one seriously. Gross irregularities are alleged in the Fourth and Fifth Wards and many shooting and cutting affrays are reported from all parts of the city.

The announcement in the Ottawa despatches that Hon. H. R. Emmerson, M. P. for Westmorland, has been summoned to Ottawa to enter the Dominion cabinet, is pleasing news to the hon. gentleman's host of friends in all parts of the province. There seems to be little doubt that he will be given the important portfolio of railways and canals vacated by Hon. Mr. Blair's resignation. Hon. Mr. Emmerson enjoys the confidence of the Liberals of the Maritime Provinces to a marked degree, and possesses the qualities which are bound to make him a strong, capable and popular minister.

The Moncton Times in noting the nomination of Hon. C. H. Macintosh as the Tory candidate in Kootenay, speaks of him as an exceptionally strong candidate, but our contemporary is apparently unaware that Mr. Macintosh tried his luck for parliament in the last election and was badly defeated.

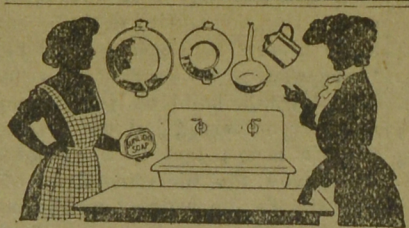
SUDDEN DEATH.

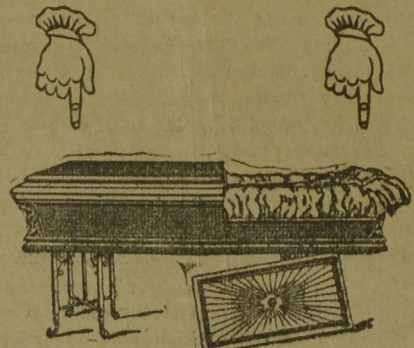
