PSYCHOLOGICAL RESEARCH.

Interesting Physical and Mental Tests at the University.

Some additional subscriptions have been received towards the Psychological Laboratory at the University, which will be devoted towards securing further instruments and apparatus which will greatly extend the facilities for scientific research amongst the students as well as deducing interesting and instructive data regarding the physical and mental abilities of all the students.

Dr. Riley has had record blanks prepared, and it is proposed to make a free test of every student in the University for their physical and mental characteristics and abilities. These tests are made with special instruments and apparatus for perception of size, strength of hand, fatigue, eyesight, color, vision, after images, association of ideas, hearing, perception of pitch, sense of smell, perception of weight, sensation areas, sensitiveness to pain, rate of perception, naming color, perception of time, association, attention, apperception, suggestibility and imagery.

Records of these tests will be preserved and the average percentage of the student body procured, thus enabling a comparison of the physical and mental traits of Canadian students with the students of large American Universities where these tests are made. These tests are of great importance for science. In the results are seen the normal type and its many variations. They show how the different students differ with conditions of heredity, education, etc., and also how the physical and mental traits are inter-related.

Moreover, they are of immense importance to the student, as they point out special defects which can be cured and special aptitude which can be improved.

These researches cannot but be of great benefit to the students as well as to the University, and the publication of the records will be looked forward to with interest.

The U. N. B. will also have the distinction of being the first among the provincial universities of making research along these lines.
