Murder Trial.

The trial of Thomas Cammack and his son, who are in jail at Woodstock charged with the murder of William Doherty at Bath, will open at Woodstock on Tuesday next. Judge Gregory will preside, and S. Dow Simmons of this city will attend as court stenographer.

The Liberal committee rooms in the Arctic Rink will be opened this evening with a grand rally. The speakers will be Senator Thompson, R. W. McLellan and others. All friends and supporters of Mr. Gibson in this contest, especially the young men, are invited to be present.

Awarded a Contract.

Mr. C. J. B. Simmons of this city, who returned yesterday from Caraque, where he has an extensive federal government contract, has received word that his tender for the contract of a Dominion government wharf at Campbellton, has been accepted. The contract will be quite a heavy one, the price being \$36,000.

Sunbury and Queens.

A meeting in the interest of Dr. Hay, the Liberal candidate in Sunbury and Queens, will be held in the court house, Burton, Thursday, Oct. 20, at noon, when addresses will be delivered by Hon. H. R. Emmerson, minister of railways and canals; Sir Frederick Borden, minister of militia and defence; and the candidate, Dr. Hay.

Appointed Engineer.

The many friends of Mr. Thomas L. Simmons, C. E., son of the late James E. Simmons of Gibson, will be pleased to learn that he has been appointed engineer of the railway commission of which Hon. A. G. Blair is the head. For some years Mr. Simmons has been connected with the department of railways and canals at Ottawa, and his new appointment is a distinct promotion. His salary is \$2,000 a year.

A Clerical Visitor.

Among the visitors in the city today is Rev. Arthur S. Morton, recently pastor of the Presbyterian church at St. Stephen, and now one of the professors at Pine Hill College, Halifax. Mr. Morton who is a son of Rev. Dr. Morton the famous Presbyterian missionary at Trinidad, is making a tour of New Brunswick, meeting students who are likely to take a course at Pine Hill in preparation for the Presbyterian ministry.

NORTHUMBERLAND CONVENTIONS.

Mr. W. S. Loggie the Liberal Standard Bearer—Mr. Robinson for the Tories.

Newcastle, N. B., Oct. 15.—A largely attended convention of the Liberals of Northumberland was held in the Temperance hall yesterday afternoon. President Watt presided. Reports of the parish association were received after which the delegates adjourned to the court house, thirty-four delegates were present. Three names were voted upon, W. S. Loggie, M. P. P., John Morrissey, M. P. P., and Geo. Watt.

The first vote was Morrissey 15, Loggie 13, and Watt 6. Watt's name was then withdrawn.

The second vote was Loggie 18 and Morrissey 16.

The delegates reported to the convention that Loggie had received the majority of votes. Mr. Loggie then addressed the convention, briefly predicting victory for the party.

Chatham, N. B., Oct. 15.—The Conservative convention held here last night was largely attended, every parish being represented. W. Hickson of Newcastle, presided, and Jas. Maher was secretary. James Robinson was unanimously nominated the candidate, all present pledging themselves to do their utmost to secure his election.

Speeches were made by Mr. Robinson, W. Hickson, J. L. Stewart, R. A. Lawlor, F. E. Neale, Dr. Cox and others.

MIGHT HAVE BEEN WORSE.

A Young Englishman Gave People a Bad Scare on King Street.

A young Englishman, employed on a farm at Roslagornish, whose name could not be learned, created considerable excitement on King street yesterday afternoon by accidentally discharging a shot gun. He drove up to the side door of Mr. E. G. Hoben's grocery with a span of horses attached to a heavy farm wagon and began to load on some bags of feed. He had a loaded shot gun lying in the bottom of the wagon, and in moving some parcels he struck the trigger of the weapon and accidentally discharged it. There was a loud report, but fortunately the muzzle of the gun was pointed at a bag of feed and the charge did no damage other than to blow a hole in the bag. Several persons were passing on the sidewalk at the time and received a very bad scare. It is a most fortunate thing that nobody was injured. The young man drove off without attempting to explain why he had the gun loaded. Such carelessness and stupidity on his part should not be allowed to pass unnoticed by the authorities.

Butter sold at 20 cents a pound, and eggs were scarce at 25 cents a dozen. Lamb brought 7 and 8 cents per pound, and pork 6 and 7 cents beef 4 and 5 cents. Hay is now worth \$11 and 13 per ton.

A PRINCELY THIEF.

Who Has Been Robbing Toronto Houses

UNDER ARREST AT TORONTO AND WANTED AT HAMILTON.

Toronto, Oct. 15.—Although Hans Waldheil, is of princely family, and is on speaking terms with the 400 of the continent, including the Swiss president, he was arrested on charges of burglary here during the past six weeks.

It is alleged he has helped himself liberally from different houses at four o'clock in the morning when the policemen are off beat.

Twelve victims already have identified their property found in his room. It appears Waldheil is wanted in Hamilton to answer similar charges.
