When the doctor was about to operate, the matron of the institution came into the room and informed him that the patient would have to be paid for in advance, before the operation would be allowed to go on. Well, said the doctor, as this is a case of emergency, I will be responsible for the pay and he paid the amount demanded and proceeded with the operation. The uncalled for action of the matron as to her promptness has caused a great deal of comment, as an hospital is generally supposed to be for the purpose of taking in such cases and it is very strange that the action should have been taken in this particular case, especially as Marysville from where the young lady was sent, subscribed a hundred dollars yearly to the institution and have been doing so for the past six or seven years, and as yet have never sent a free patient to be treated. Your correspondent while talking the matter over with one of the town councillors of Marysville was informed by him that he would strongly oppose the hundred dollar grant another year.

WHY JAPANESE WON.

Exhibited an Utter Disregard for Life in the Yalu Battle.

London, May 9.—The Times to-day has the following from Antung, Manchuria, dated May 3:—The defeat of the Russians on the Yalu River must be compared to the naval disaster at Port Arthur. It was due, primarily, to perfunctory and old-fashioned methods while the success of the Japanese must be attributed to a perfect acquaintance with modern conditions, admirable intelligence, the skillful utilization of military factors, and concentration at a psychological moment upon a weak point on the Russian line. There masterly execution and steady, unostentatious methods of observation greatly impressed me.

In morale Japanese soldiers are equal, possibly superior, to European troops. Their tactics are superior to those of the Russians, and they completely outwitted the Russian, who did not contemplate any serious defence. The loss of the guns was due to the slaughter of the horses, the quick movements of the Japanese, and the utter disregard for life which they displayed.
