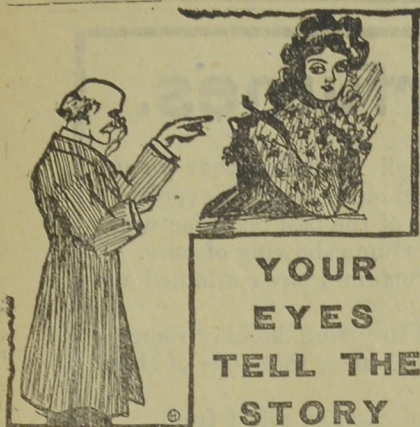

HEIRESS SUED FOR \$50,000 FOR BREACH OF PROMISE.

New York, Nov. 29.—Mrs. Fannie Sordam Stelle will shortly marry Edgar R. Accetta, an Italian baritone singer.

Mrs. Stelle, who is very wealthy has resided in New York for some years. She is 62 years old. Accetta is 24 and has spent most of his life as a real estate agent.

Mrs. Stelle possesses a fortune of \$2,000,000. Accetta recently entered suit against her for \$50,000 for breach of promise.

Saturday night a compromise was reached, whereby she settled \$25,000 on Accetta as an ante-nuptial gift, and then stopped the suit by promising to marry him. Mrs. Stelle looks 20 years younger than her age of 62. She is of medium height, of plump figure, and a kindly expression lights up her face. Her apartment has been known as a place where leading musicians of America and foreigners visiting here might be heard in private. Accetta was one of her proteges. As Fanny Sordam she was known years ago as one of the most beautiful girls in Chicago. Her father, a wholesale hardware dealer, was wealthy. She married Alexander J. Stelle, a Chicago man, with whom she lived happily for many years. On his death he left her a fortune of more than \$1,000,000, which was increased by another million shortly afterward by the death of her mother.

Mrs. Stelle came to New York to live in the 90's. In April, 1900, she was married a second time to Dr. Edward Bradley. For a year they lived together, after which Mrs. Stelle took apartments at the Croisic. Dr. Bradley at once began to fail, and in a few months died. When his will was opened it was found that he had left almost his entire fortune of \$150,000 and a fine residence to a young woman artist who had nursed him through his last illness. Nothing was left to Mrs. Stelle. Inquiry revealed the fact that without public proceedings she had obtained an annulment of the marriage on the ground that Dr. Bradley was addicted to the use of drugs. Those best acquainted with Dr. Bradley then said the annulment hastened his death.

AT A MALAY WEDDING.

Guests Throw Pails of Perfume Over One Another.

A royal marriage in the Far East—Malay States is a costly affair. At Keda, in the Malay Peninsula, five royal marriages have just taken place amidst great rejoicings. The festivities continued for over a month and the estimated cost of the entertainment was about \$400,000.

The capital of the little state where the Sultan and his court resided, Alor Star, was prepared for the occasion regardless of expense. Triumphant arches were erected in the vicinity of the palace; and temporary structures, representing pagodas, towers and pavilions, were built along the main street of the town. Over 10,000 lights illuminated the place at night.

Hospitalities were conducted on the most liberal scale. Invitations for a ten days' stay or more were sent to most of the European residents in towns 50 miles away; and those who went were sumptuously entertained.

Launches took them for a six hours' journey to the capital free of charge; houses belonging to the Sultan's chief officers were placed at

their disposal, with carriages and servants; and the Hall of Justice was converted into a banquet room, where 200 people sat down every night, the Sultan's brother presiding. The only ladies at these banquets were the European guests; and they were taken down to dinner by members of the royal family.

After the wedding the bride and bridegroom sat on a raised dais to receive their brides, who were railed off from the throne, the ladies and the men apart. Under each guest's chair was a small pail of perfumed water, and after the bride and bridegroom had sat in state for some minutes, the Sultan's brother took his pail of water and threw the contents over the Sultan, who reciprocated with his pail.

Then everybody present jumped upon the chairs and made a rush for certain paper imitations of fishes, balloons, lamps and other devices, which were hanging from the roof; and picking up their respective pails, threw the water over each other till everybody was drenched. Men and women joined in the pastime, and when the pails were emptied they were refilled from large jars, until these were emptied as well.

This amusement at Malay weddings is said to correspond to the throwing of rice and confetti in other countries.
