

SITUATION DESPERATE.

Port Garrison on Scant Fare
and Ammunition Scarce.ANOTHER BATTLE OPENED IN THE
VICINITY OF MUKDEN.

Baltic Fleet Not Likely to go East.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Mukden, Sept. 17.—The Japanese are reported to be advancing on both flanks from the east, southeast and southwest.

The outposts are closely engaged twenty miles southeastward, there being almost continual skirmishes.

Indications point to another great battle in the vicinity of Mukden.

The Russian troops occupy all the surrounding villages.

Refugees are flocking into the city, and the Chinese among them complain of the severity on the part of the Japanese.

New York, Sept. 17.—The New York Herald's St. Petersburg correspondent says: "I hear from well informed sources that the situation of General Stoessel at Port Arthur is considered extremely critical, owing to lack of ammunition.

The fact cannot be surprising to any one who has noticed the terrific output of shot and shell since Jan. last.

Stoessel has full liberty to surrender when he feels it necessary. Indeed he has instructions to do so, independent and apart from the scarcity of ammunition.

The garrison for some time has been reduced to a diet of black bread while masses of unburied bodies which the Japanese refuse to allow to be buried, cause a terrible pollution of the air.

Neither Mukden nor Tie Lung will be seriously held. The latter has been styled the Thermo-Pylasass of Manchuria, but it can be easily turned down.

Owing to the latest news from Port Arthur, the idea of the Baltic fleet starting, appears to be quite abandoned.

BURNS' MONUMENT.

Montreal Scotchmen Propose to Erect a \$15,000 One.

NEWFOUNDLAND ELECTIONS.

To be Held October 31st --- Three Parties in the Field.

St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 17.—The Newfoundland Legislature has been dissolved. A general election for a new parliament will occur October 31 with three parties in the field, the Government party, headed by Premier Sir Robert Bond, being opposed by two organizations, one being headed by ex-Premier Sir William Whiteway and the other by ex-Premier Goodridge.
